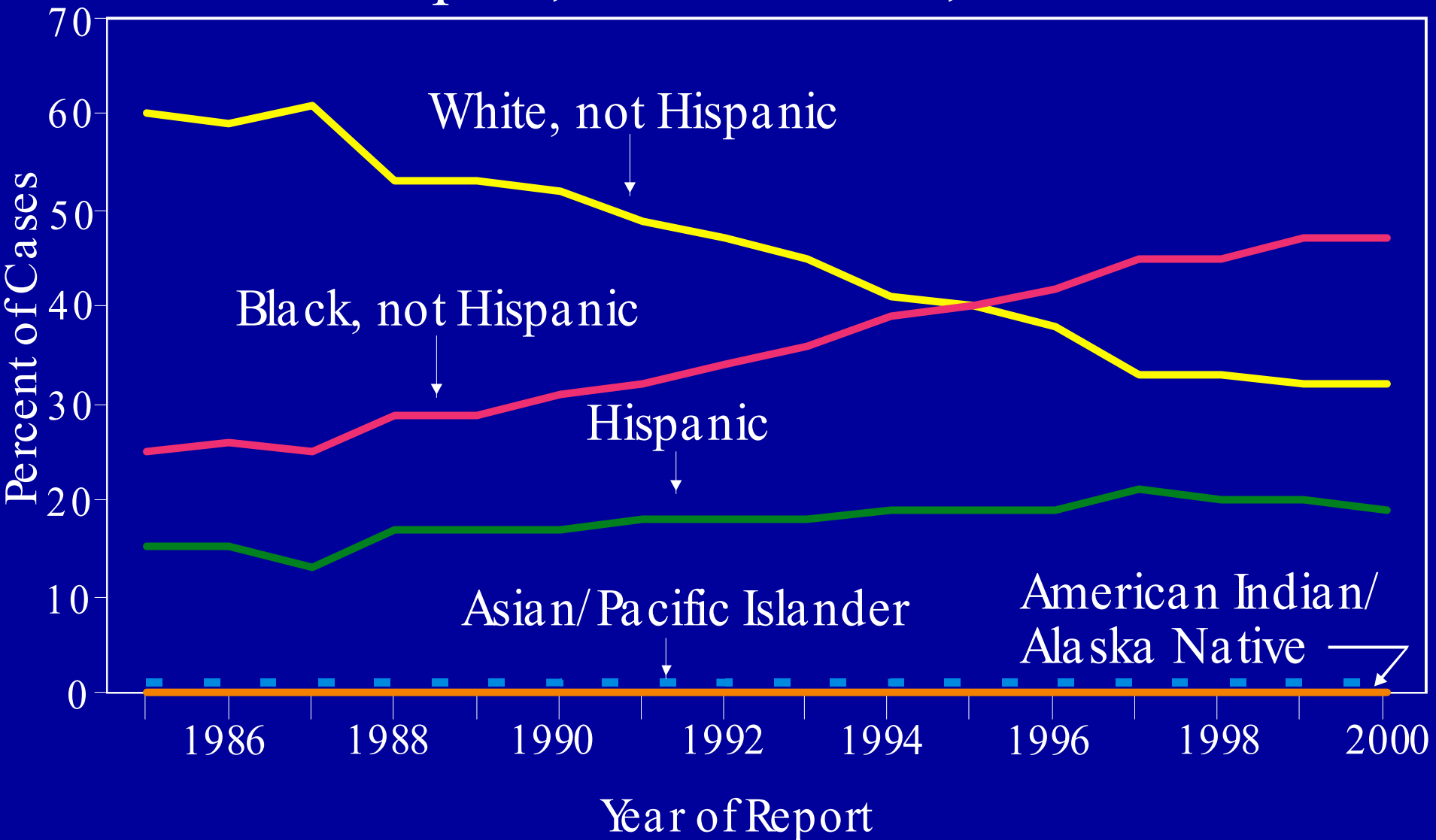

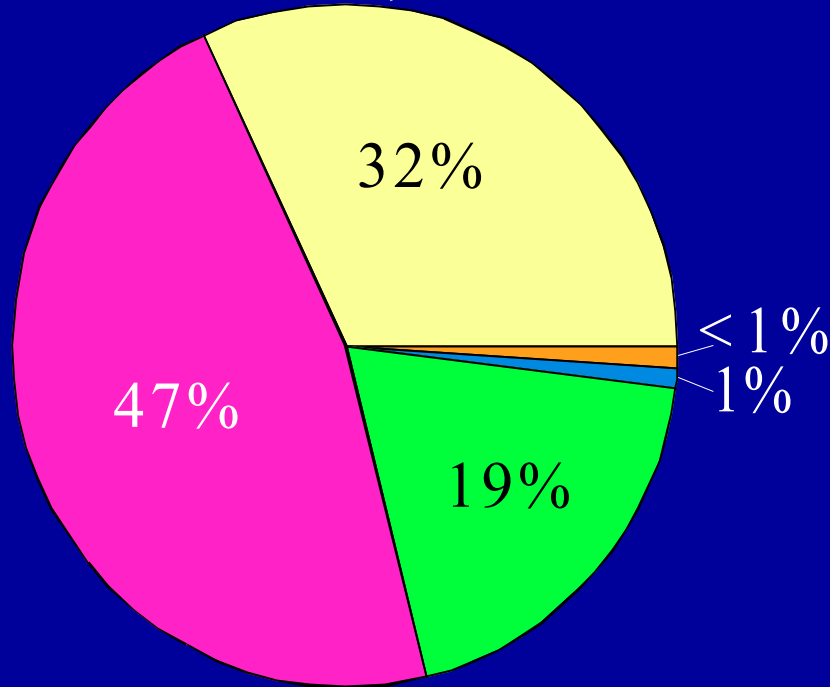

# Proportion of AIDS Cases, by Race/Ethnicity and Year of Report, 1985 - 2000, United States

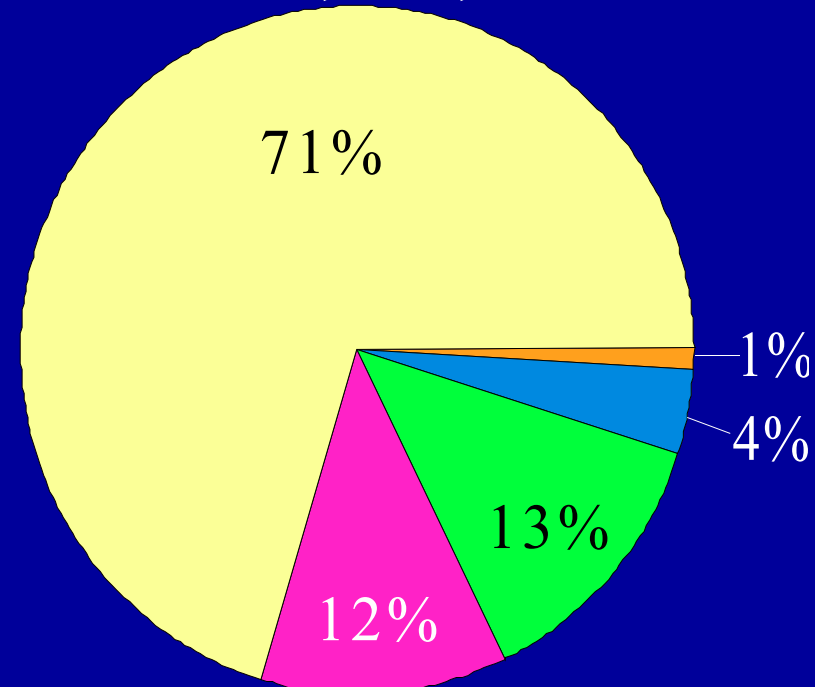


# AIDS Cases Reported in 2000 and Estimated 2000 Population, by Race/Ethnicity, United States

# AIDS in Blacks and Hispanics

Of the 774,467 AIDS cases reported to CDC through 2000, Blacks and Hispanics accounted for

56% of total

78% of women

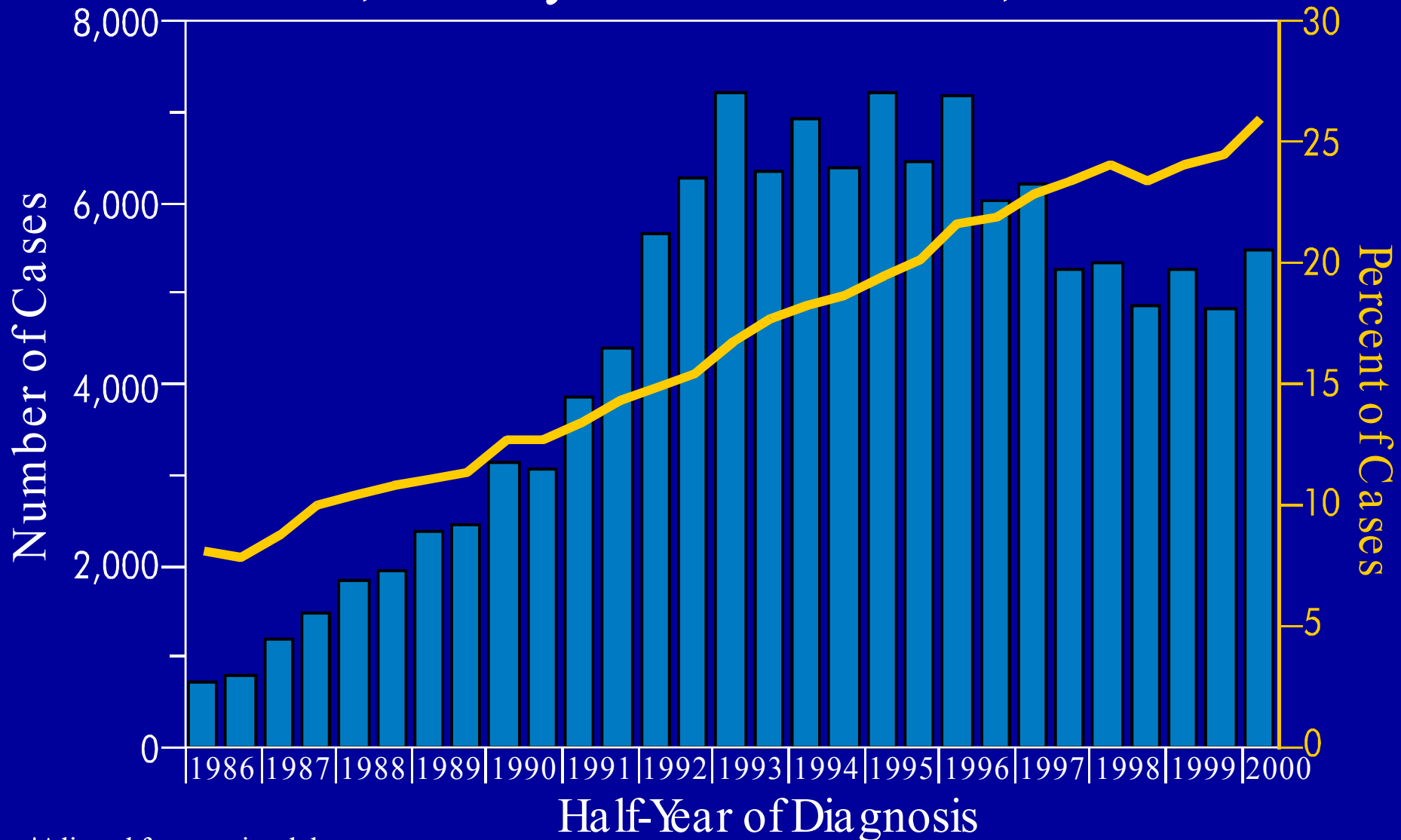
79% of heterosexuals\*

82% of children

Of AIDS cases reported in 2000, 66% were among Black and Hispanic adults and adolescents.

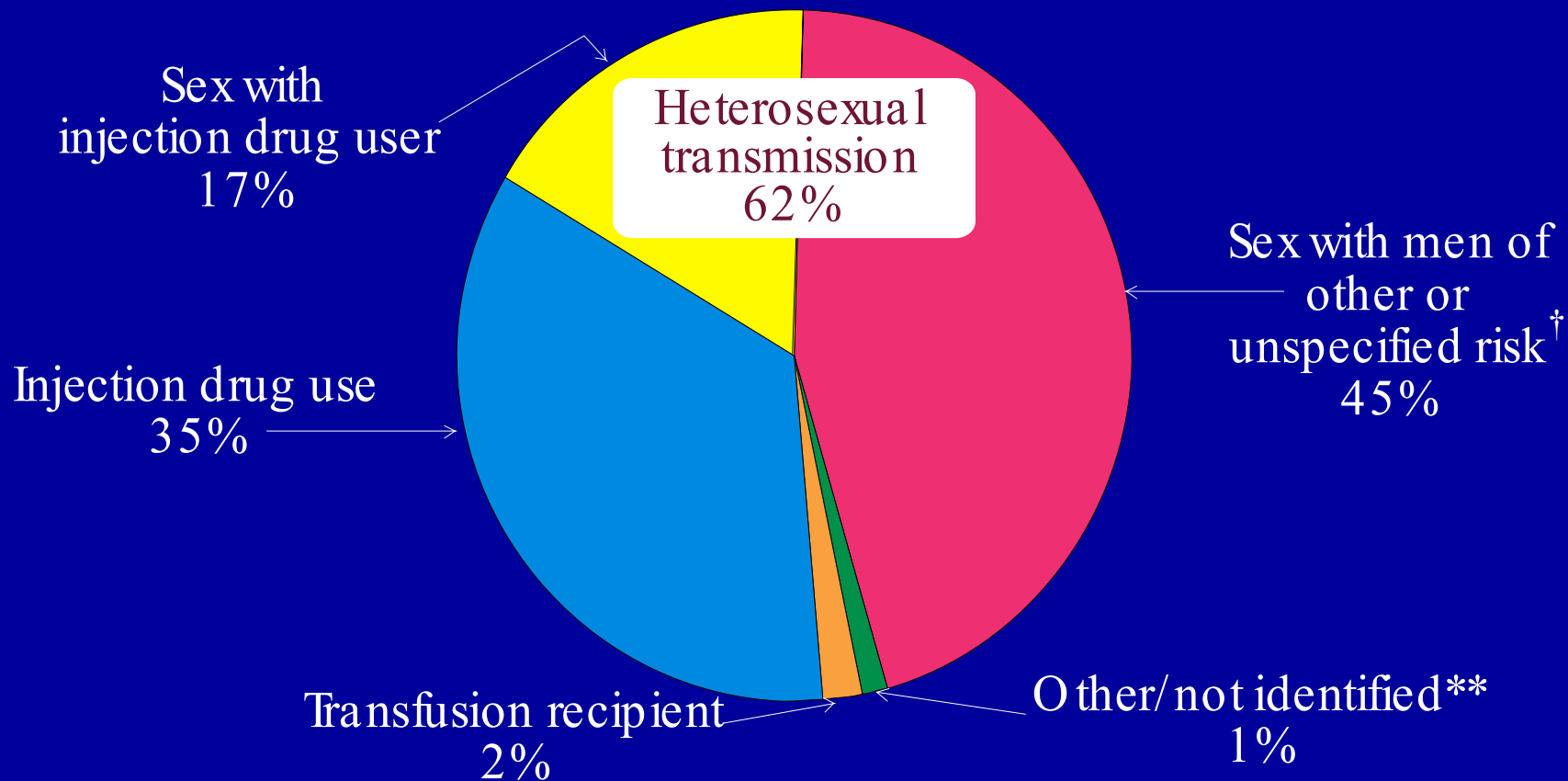

# Estimates\* of AIDS in Women, by Exposure Category Diagnosed July 1999-June 2000, United States



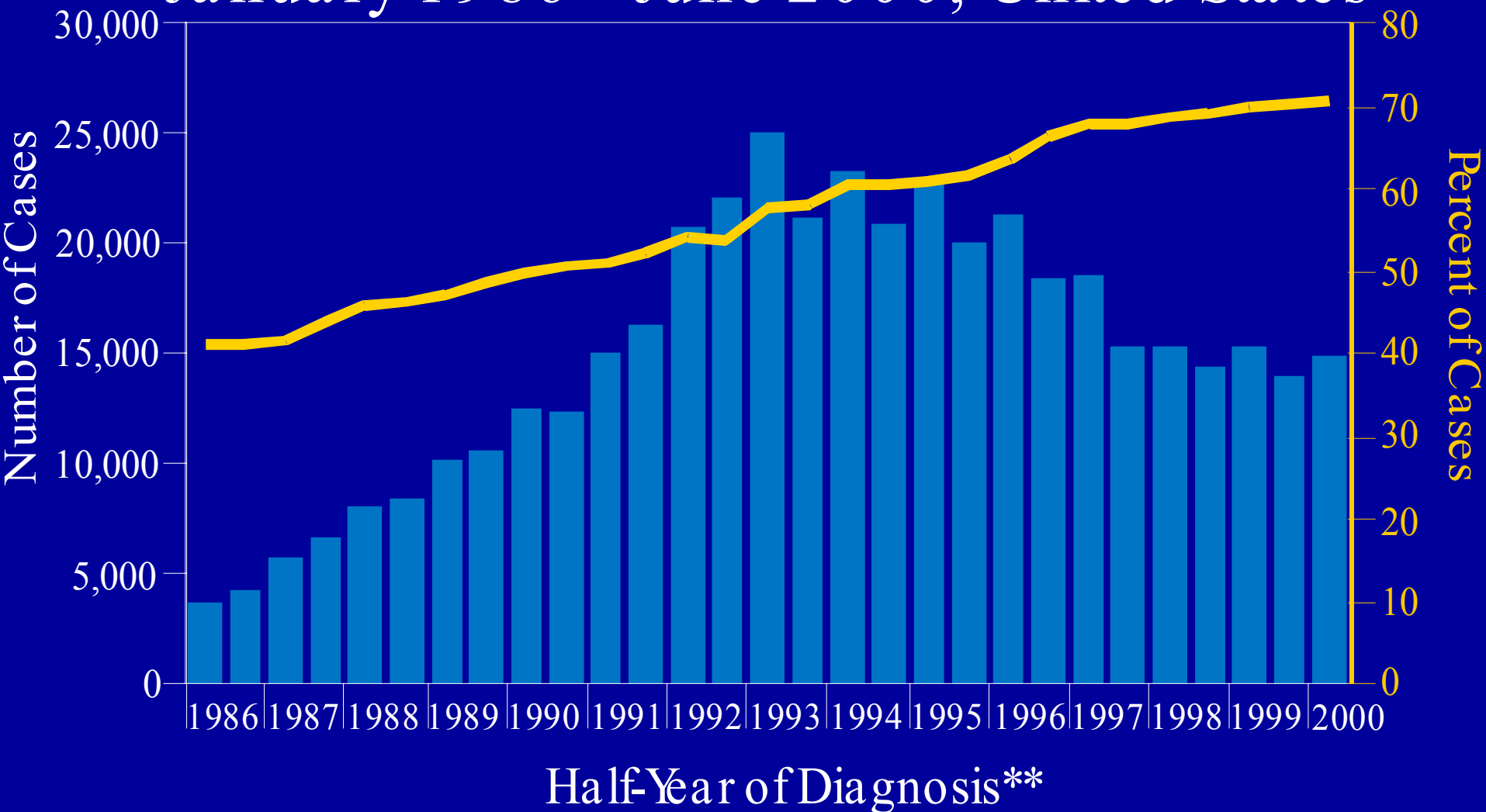
