Methodology

The Kaiser/Harvard School of Public Health's Health News Index is product of the Kaiser/Harvard School of Public Health Program on the Public and Health Policy. It was designed and analyzed by researchers at the Kaiser Family Foundation and staff of the Harvard School of Public Health (under the direction of Professor Robert J. Blendon, Sc.D.). Fieldwork was conducted by telephone by Princeton Survey Research Associates with 1,006 national adults (age 18 or older) nationwide between February 4-8, 2000. The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 3 percent. The margin of sampling error may be higher for some of the sub-groups noted in the analysis. Note that in addition to sampling error there are other possible sources of measurement error.

NOTE: Some results will not add to 100% because of rounding
