# Post-Election Survey: The Public and the Health Care Agenda for the New Administration and Congress

## Methodology

The Kaiser Family Foundation/Harvard School of Public Health *Post-Election Survey: The Public and the Health Care Agenda for the New Administration and Congress* was designed and analyzed by researchers at the Kaiser Family Foundation and Harvard School of Public Health. The survey is a product of the Kaiser/Harvard School of Public Health Program on The Public and Health Policy.

Fieldwork was conducted by telephone by Princeton Survey Research Associates between November 13 and December 13, 2000. A randomly selected nationally representative sample of 1,415 adults 18 years or older including, 1,052 adults who said they voted in the November election were included. The margin of sampling error for the overall study is  $\pm$ -3 percentage points,  $\pm$ -3 percentage points for the voter sample and  $\pm$ -6 percentage points for the non-voter sample (n = 354). For results based on subsets of respondents the margin of sampling error is higher. Note that in addition to sampling error there are other possible sources of measurement error.

Notes: Select questions were asked of a random half of the entire sample. These questions are identified by "Form 1" and "Form 2" indicating which half answered that particular question. All questions appear in the order they were asked of respondents. Some percentages will not add to 100% because of rounding. VOL means response was volunteered by respondent, rather than a response to an explicitly offered choice.
