Todd Summers

Todd Summers is a Senior Advisor for Global Health at the ONE Campaign, where he helps lead their work to address urgent health issues facing people living in poor countries. Prior to that, he was a Senior Program Officer within the Global Health Policy and Advocacy team at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. There, he lead a Multilateral Relations team responsible for coordinating the Foundation's engagement with major partners including the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria; the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization; and Unitaid. He served as the foundation's representative on the Global Fund's board of directors, and remains Vice Chair of the board's Policy and Strategy Committee.

Before joining the staff in February 2005, Summers was president of Progressive Health Partners, a DCbased consulting firm specializing in public health policy he founded in 2000. From 1997 to 2000, Summers was the deputy director of the White House Office of National AIDS Policy. While there, he helped coordinate the nation's domestic HIV/AIDS work and to launch the administration's first international AIDS initiative.

In his personal capacity, he currently serves on the board of the AIDS Vaccine Advocacy Coalition and Haiti's Matenwa Community Learning Center. He has a BA cum laude in Religion from Middlebury College in Middlebury, Vermont (1982).

Beth Tritter

Beth Tritter is a Managing Director at The Glover Park Group and specializes in policymaker-focused education and advocacy, coalition building and management, and strategic communications. Beth focuses primarily on clients with an interest in U.S. foreign policy, and specifically U.S. global health and development policy. She has also worked with a range of non-profit organizations, advocacy coalitions, and foundations – including the Modernizing Foreign Assistance Network, the Better World Campaign, the International Conservation Partnership, and the Center for Strategic and International Studies — on legislative strategy, campaign planning and outreach, and messaging.

Beth joined GPG after nearly a decade on Capitol Hill, serving most recently as Legislative Director for Congresswoman Nita Lowey of New York, former Chairwoman (and current Ranking Member) of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on State and Foreign Operations. In this capacity, Ms. Tritter led the strategic planning for and oversaw the implementation of Lowey's domestic and foreign policy agendas, and acted as Congresswoman Lowey's lead representative in setting Democratic priorities for and negotiating the yearly, foreign aid bill.

Beth received Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from the University of Pennsylvania in Modern Middle Eastern Studies, and studied at the American University in Cairo, Egypt.

Allen Moore

Allen Moore joined the Stimson Center as a Senior Adviser early in 2009, working primarily with the Global Health Security Program. He is also a lecturer in global health at George Washington University. He has more than 35 years of senior level experience in the government and private sectors. Most recently he was Senior Fellow at the Global Health Council and he has been a Senior Associate at the Center for Strategic and International Studies since 2005. He has also worked as a consultant on global health strategy to a large foundation. Previously, while serving as Deputy Chief of Staff and Policy Director to former Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, M.D. (R-TN), Moore helped develop the 2003 legislation authorizing President Bush's global HIV/AIDS program (commonly known as PEPFAR). He was actively involved in the re-authorization of PEPFAR in 2008.

In prior government service, Moore served as Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade Administration under President Reagan; Chief of Staff for the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation; Legislative Director to former Senator John Danforth (R-MO); Associate Director of the Domestic Policy Staff in President Ford's White House; and Staff Economist at the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. In the private sector, Moore was president of the national trade association of the U.S. waste services industry and a partner in two Washington D.C. consulting firms, where he provided strategic advice to U.S. and foreign clients.

Moore has testified before several Congressional Committees; has appeared many times on radio and television; and has authored numerous articles and opinion pieces for major newspapers and other publications. He appears regularly as a guest lecturer on government and the legislative process, including in the field of global health and the origins of PEPFAR. Moore received his undergraduate degree in Economics from Pomona College, and his M.B.A. from Stanford University. He served in the Peace Corps in the Bolivian Andes. Moore has served on the Board of Directors/Overseers of the International Rescue Committee since 1980.

Jennifer Kates

Jennifer Kates is Vice President and Director of Global Health & HIV Policy at the Kaiser Family Foundation, where she oversees the Foundation's policy analysis and research focused on the U.S. government's role in global health and on the global and domestic HIV epidemics. Widely regarded as an expert in the field, she regularly publishes and presents on global health issues and is particularly known for her work on analyzing donor government investments in global health; assessing and mapping the U.S. government's global health architecture, programs, and funding; and tracking key trends in the HIV epidemic, a area she has been working in for more than twenty years. Prior to joining the Foundation in 1998, Ms. Kates was a Senior Associate with The Lewin Group, a health care consulting firm, where she focused on HIV policy, strategic planning/health systems analysis, and health care for vulnerable populations. Prior to that, she directed the Office of Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Concerns at Princeton University.

Ms. Kates serves on numerous federal and private sector advisory committees on global health and HIV/AIDS issues. Currently, she is a member of the Institute of Medicine's committee to evaluate the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR). She also serves on two IOM committees commissioned by the White House to inform the National HIV/AIDS Strategy.

Ms. Kates received her master's degree in public affairs from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, and her bachelor's in political science from Dartmouth College. She also holds a masters degree in political science from the University of Massachusetts. Currently, she is pursuing a doctorate in public policy at George Washington University, where she is also a lecturer.
