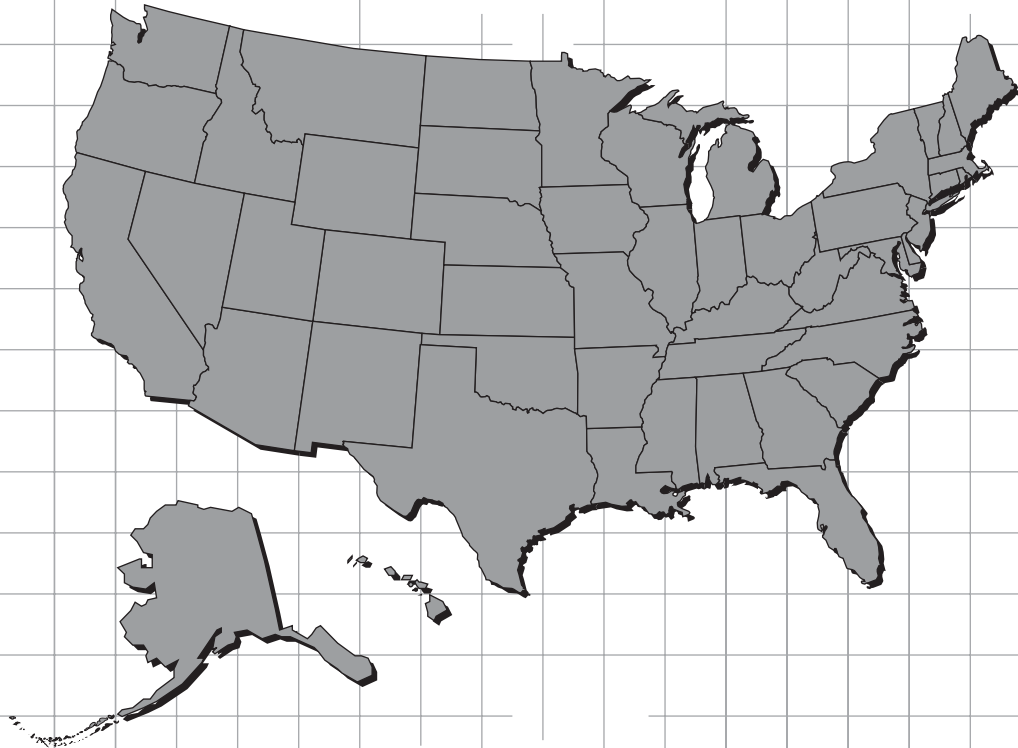

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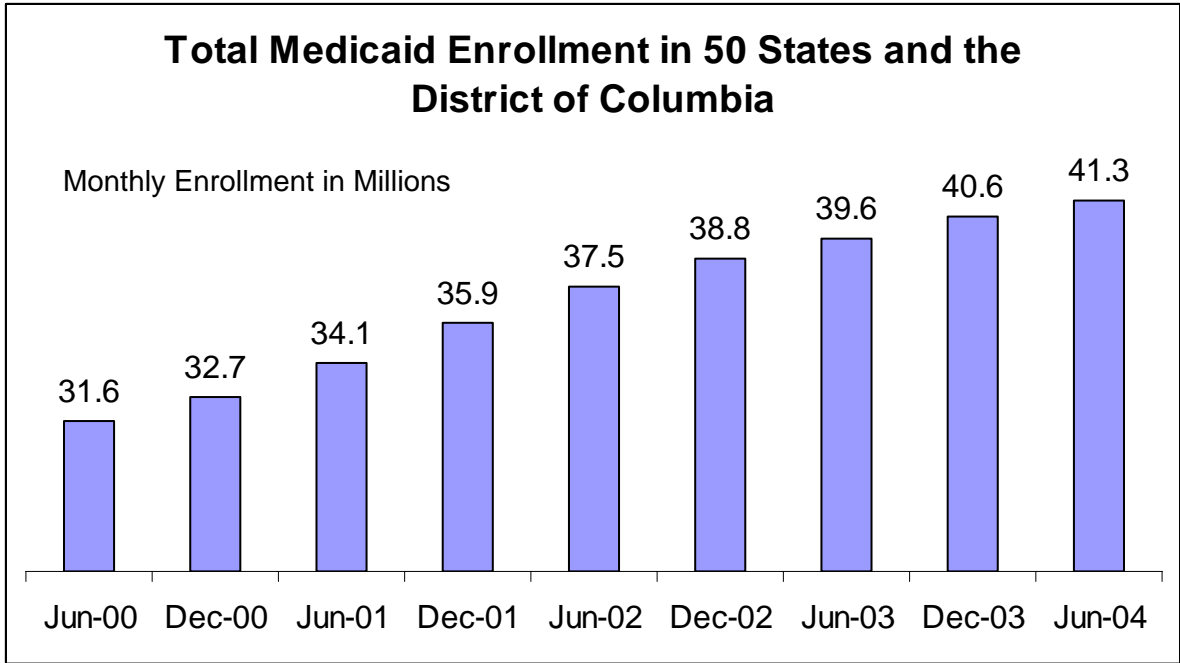
## Executive Summary

In June 2004, a total of 41.3 million persons were enrolled with full Medicaid coverage or as low-income Medicare beneficiaries for whom Medicaid pays some or all of Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance in the 50 states and the District of Columbia.<sup>1</sup> Over the year ending in June 2004, the number of individuals with full Medicaid coverage or coverage as low-income Medicare beneficiaries increased by 1.6 million, or by 4.1%. Medicaid enrollment nationally has increased at every six-month interval since December 1998. Looking at annual enrollment changes from since 2000:

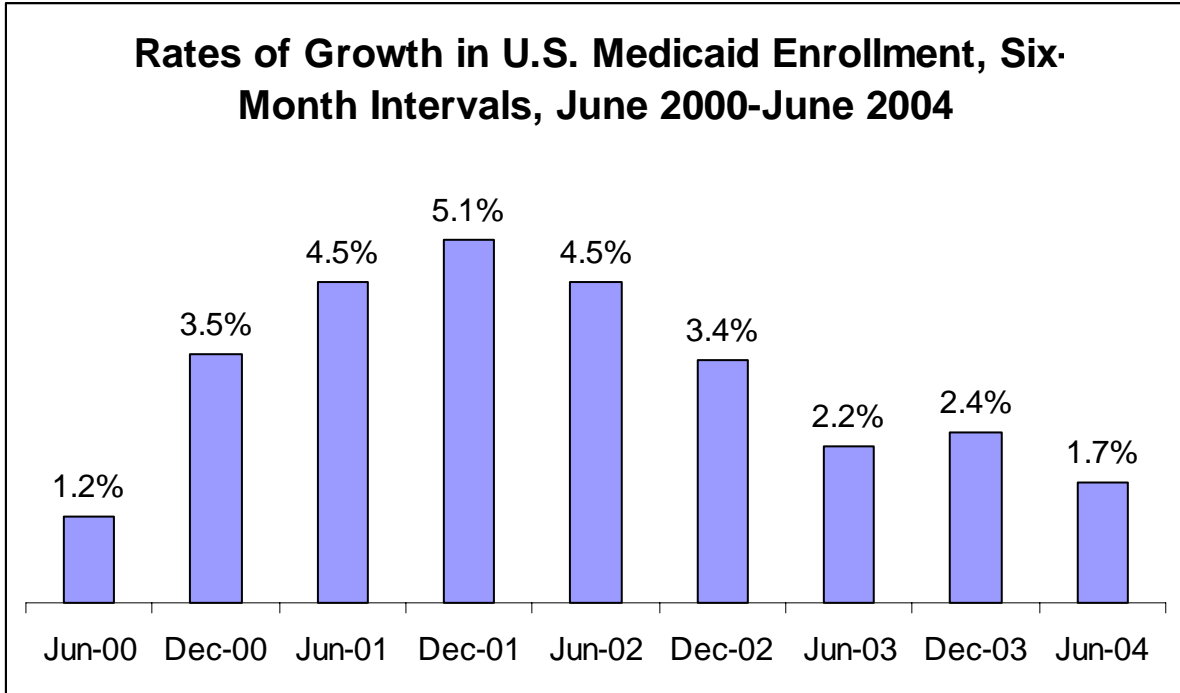
- Growth accelerated to 8.1% from June 2000 to June 2001, reflecting the impact of the economic downturn. This was a sharp increase from the previous year's growth rate of 3.2%. The rate of growth continued to accelerate with annual growth of 9.9% from June 2001 to June 2002.
- Beginning in the period between June 2002 to June 2003, the rate of growth decreased to 5.7%. The rate of growth continued to slow between June 2003 to June 2004 to 4.1%. In part, this growth reflected the continuing effects of the economic downturn. The rate of growth likely would have been higher except for budget-driven policies instituted in many states in 2002 and 2003 specifically designed to slow enrollment growth. These policies included reductions in eligibility levels and the reversal of previous efforts to simplify and streamline eligibility processes.

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<sup>1</sup> The "point-in-time" monthly enrollment counts in this report differ from enrollment counts in other reports that show the number of persons "ever-enrolled" at any time and for any length of time over a year. For example, using an "ever-enrolled" methodology, the Congressional Budget Office reported in its March 2005 Medicaid Baseline report that Medicaid covers 58 million individuals. These data do not include children enrolled in Medicaid expansion SCHIP programs funded through Title XXI. Prior reports in this series did include these enrollees for some states. While these Medicaid-expansion SCHIP enrollees are excluded from all totals, they are still included in some categories for this report. Future reports in this series will exclude all SCHIP enrollees.



Examining enrollment growth in semi-annual periods shows that the *rate* of enrollment growth slowed in each of the three six-month periods through June 2003, increased slightly in the June-December 2003 period and then slowed further in the December 2003 to June 2004 period. The six-month growth rate was 1.7% from December 2003 to June 2004. This is the lowest six-month rate of growth since the December 1999 to June 2000 period.



The national trends mask considerable variation across states. Over the year from June 2003 to June 2004, U.S. enrollment grew on average by 4.1%, but:

- The three states with the highest growth rates were Colorado (12.6%), Virginia (11.4%), and Illinois (9.5%).
- Enrollment declined (by as much as 5.2%) in eight states.

Rates of growth also vary by category of enrollment. Based on data from the 44 states reporting data for these categories, enrollment of families, children and pregnant women increased by 4.5% from June 2003 to June 2004. This is lower than the 7.8% growth that occurred in the year ending in June 2003 for these categories. However, the growth rate for these categories is still greater than the overall increase of 4.1%.

Enrollment in the aged, blind, and disabled categories has increased in each period covered by this report. In the period from June 2003 to June 2004, enrollment increased by 2.8%. This represented a slowing from the 3.9% average annual rate of growth recorded for the previous two-year period ending in June 2003, but it was above the 2.5% average annual rates of growth for the two-year period ending in June 2001 (based on data for 44 states). Although the number of aged, blind and disabled Medicaid enrollees is smaller than other categories, the continued growth of this population is important to note because it is on average more expensive per enrollee to cover these categories of Medicaid beneficiaries.

The growth of the Medicaid program in recent years has been an important buffer against losses of health coverage in the employer-based market. In 2004, the percentage of Americans with employer-based health coverage was lower than in 2003, but the percentage of Americans on Medicaid increased. Though the number of uninsured also grew slightly in 2004, the 4.1% growth in Medicaid monthly enrollment between June 2003 and June 2004 kept the growth in the uninsured from being larger.<sup>2</sup>

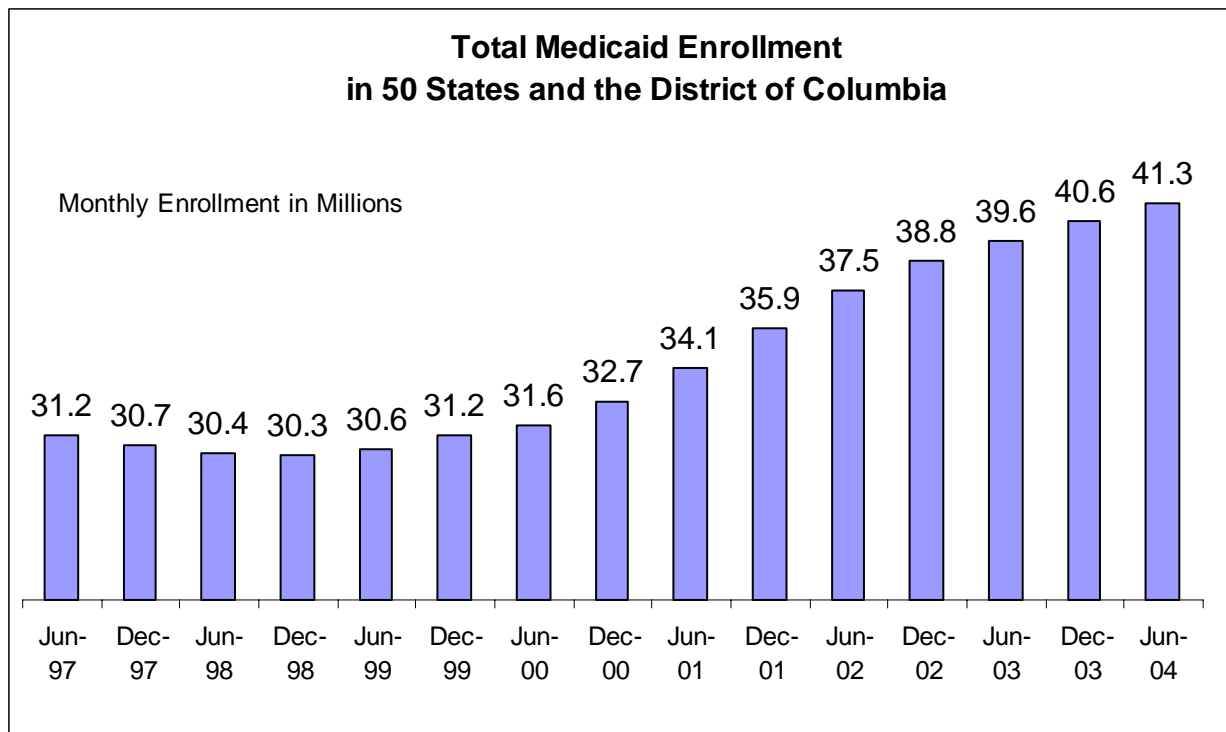

## Total Medicaid Enrollment in the 50 States and D.C.

All fifty states and the District of Columbia provided data on the total number of individuals enrolled in their Medicaid programs for each June and December from June 1997 to June 2004.<sup>3</sup> These data show that Medicaid enrollment has increased for the six consecutive years preceeding June 2004, after declining from June 1997 to December 1998, reaching a total of 41.3 million in June 2004.<sup>4</sup> (See Figure 1 and Table 1a). In the aggregate, for the 50 states and the District of Columbia, Medicaid enrollment increased by 4.1% from June 2003 to June 2004. (Figure 3.) This rate of increase is considerably smaller than the 8.1% increase from June 2000 to June 2001 and the 9.9% increase from June 2001 to June 2002.

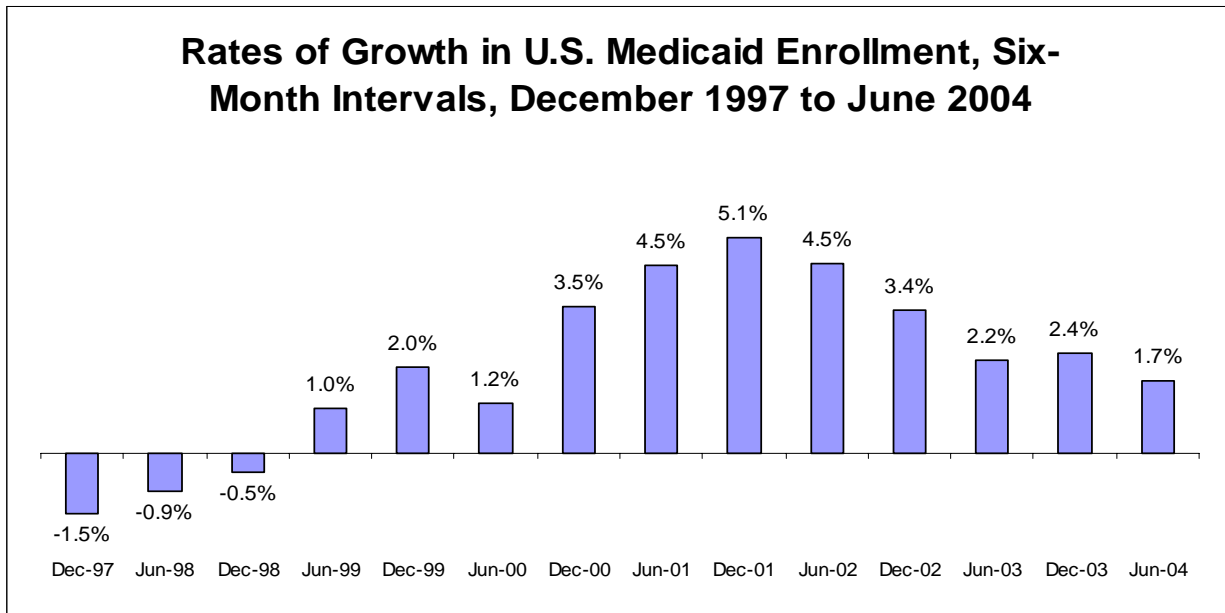


The rate of enrollment growth began to slow in 2002. The rate of increase in Medicaid enrollment was lower in the period from December 2003 to June 2004 than in any six-month period since the interval from December 1999 to June 2000. (See Figures 2a and 2b).

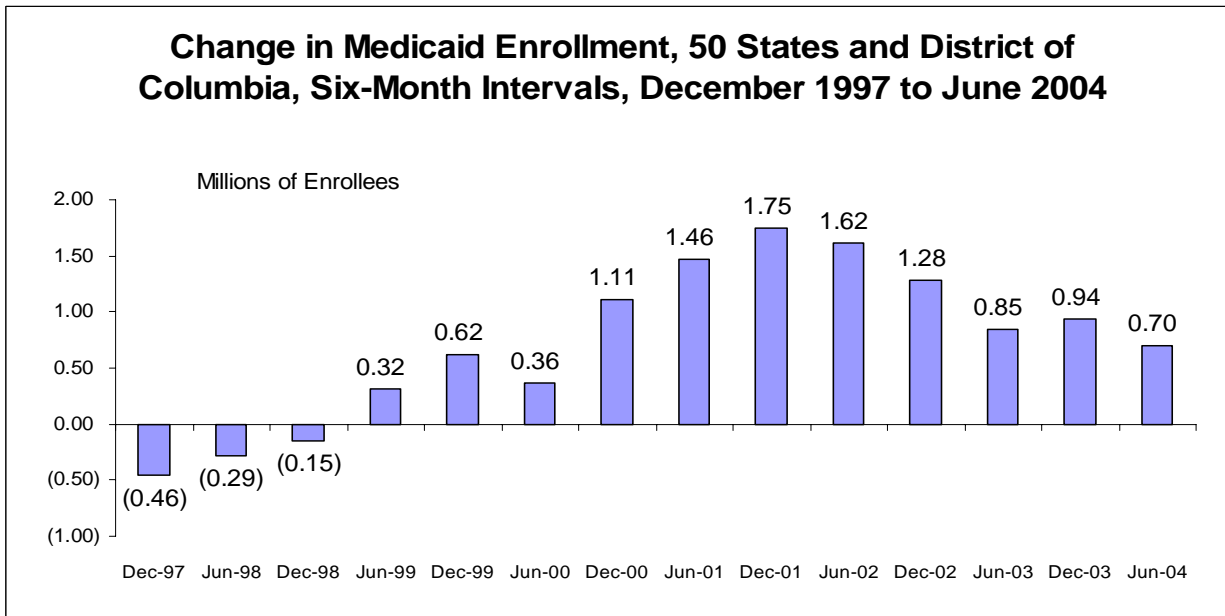
<sup>4</sup> This report focuses on these 41.3 million individuals, of whom about 40.2 million have full Medicaid coverage.<sup>4</sup> Total U.S. Medicaid enrollment in June 2004, including the Territories and those with partial coverage, totaled 45.6 million individuals. Total enrollment excluded SCHIP beneficiaries, but included over a million individuals in the U.S. territories, and over 3.2 million individuals with single-benefit Medicaid waiver coverage for family planning or pharmacy services only.

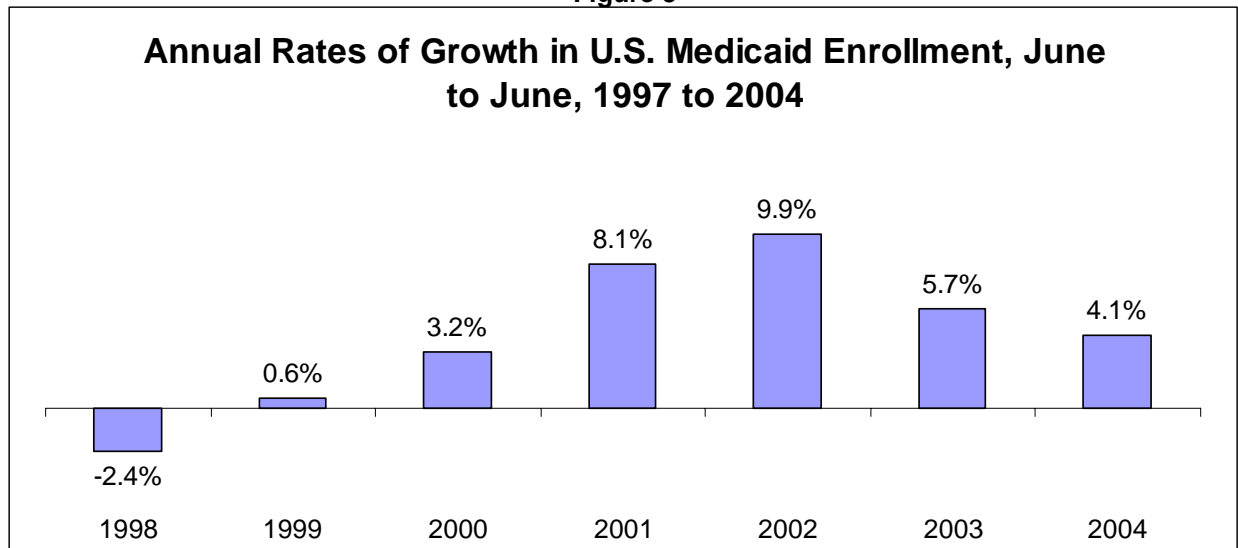

The Jobs and Growth Tax Relief Act of 2003, enacted in June 2003, provided a temporary 2.95 percentage point increase in the federal share of Medicaid costs for payments made by states during the time period beginning April 2003 and ending June 2004. This enhanced federal Medicaid match was contingent upon states not changing eligibility standards that existed on September 3, 2003 until at least after July 1, 2004.

A recent survey of Medicaid officials indicated that economic recovery has had a limited impact on slowing Medicaid enrollment growth in the first part of FY 2004. Medicaid enrollment was anticipated to increase by 5.5% in state FY 2004, which is July 2003 through June 2004 for most states.<sup>5</sup> The actual increase of 4.1% from June 2003 to June 2004 was slightly less than expected.

Between June 2003 and December 2003 only one state, Georgia, reported a planned measure to restrict eligibility for Medicaid recipients. Georgia imposed premiums for disabled children eligible for Medicaid under its “Katie Beckett” option.<sup>6</sup>

No states reported planned or implemented eligibility restrictions between December 2003 and June 2004.

### Variations in Medicaid Enrollment by State

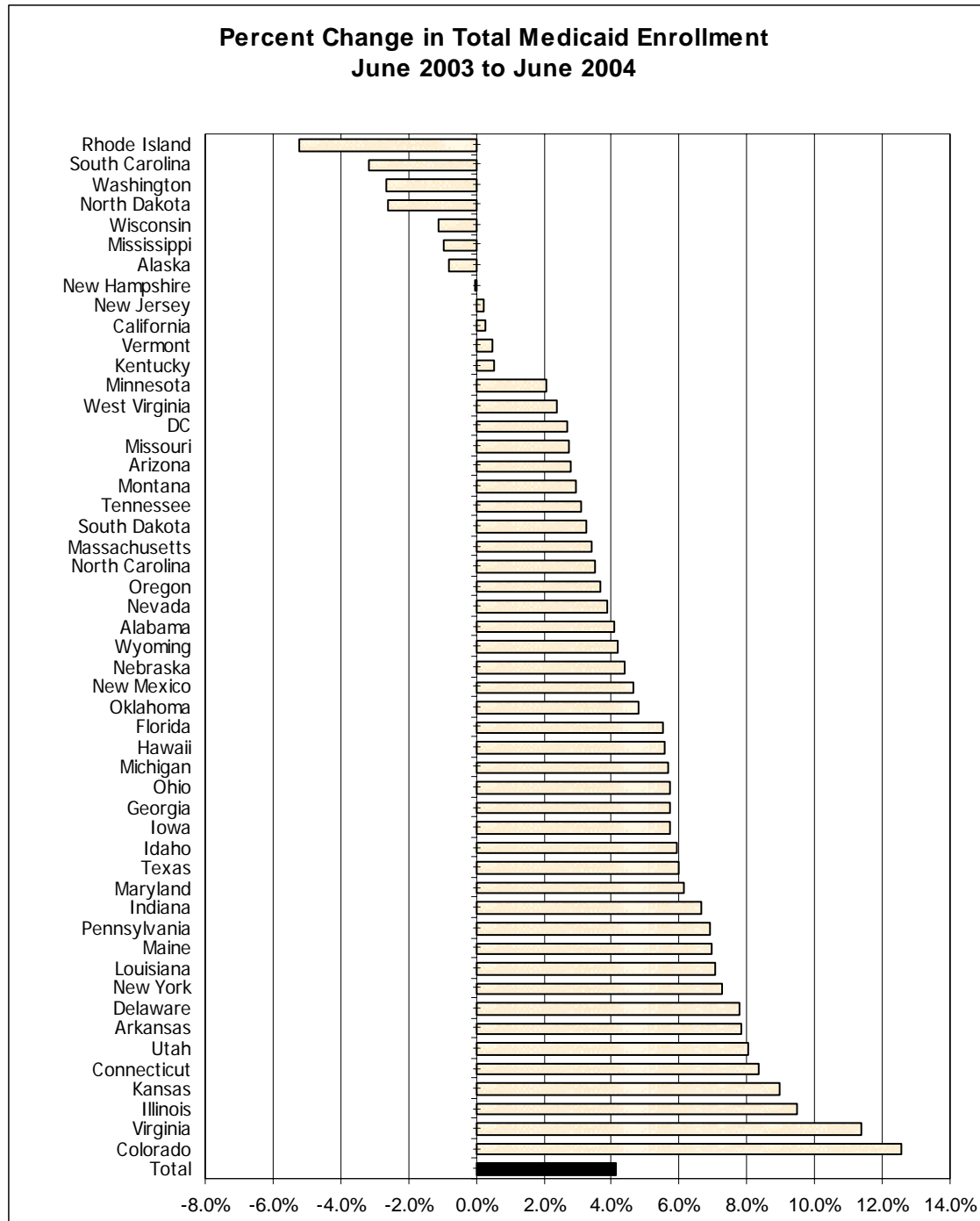
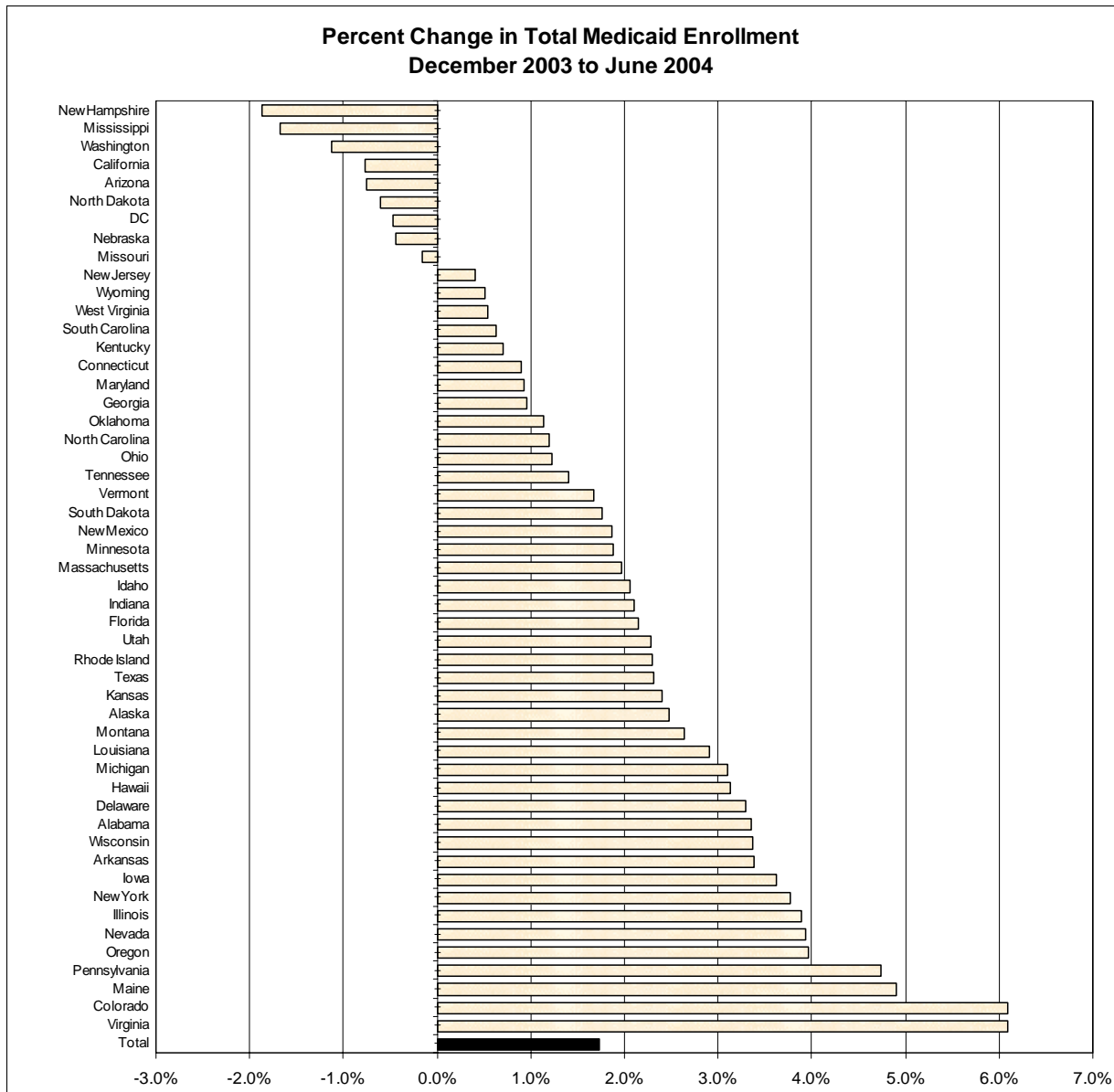


Figure 4b shows the variation in state experience for the most recent six-month period covered by this report.

While total Medicaid enrollment increased by 4.1% from June 2003 to June 2004, enrollment growth varied widely from state to state (Table 1b and Figure 4a). Eight states had annual enrollment decreases (ranging from -0.1% to -5.2%) and forty-two states plus D.C. had enrollment increases (ranging from 0.2% to 12.6%).

In the six-month period from December 2003 to June 2004, total U.S. Medicaid enrollment increased by 1.7%, but again states experienced significant variation (Figure 4b). Nine states had six-month enrollment decreases (ranging from -0.2% to -1.9%) and forty-one states plus D.C. had six-month enrollment increases (ranging from 0.4% to 6.1%).

## States with Significant Enrollment Declines from December 2003 to June 2004

The state-specific changes for states with enrollment decreases in this six-month period were more moderate than those that occurred in the last six months of 2003.<sup>7</sup> No states had enrollment declines larger than 2% between December 2003 and June 2004. One likely reason for this difference was the prohibition on reductions in Medicaid eligibility standards that was included in the Jobs and Growth Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2003. As a condition for receiving a 2.95% increase from April 2003 to June 2004 in the federal matching rate (FMAP), states were prohibited from reducing eligibility standards from September 2003 to June 2004.

New Hampshire had the greatest percentage drop in enrollment between December 2003 and June 2004 at -1.9%, but this followed a 1.9% increase from June 2003 to December 2003.

In Mississippi, where total enrollment decreased by 1.7% from December 2003 to June 2004, the greatest decrease was in the number of children enrolled in the program at a decrease of 3.5%. However the state did not report any changes in eligibility standards or processes.<sup>8</sup>

## States with the Largest Enrollment Increases from December 2003 to June 2004

Colorado, Virginia and Maine experienced six-month enrollment growth of 4.9% or more between December 2003 and June 2004.

Almost all of Colorado's 6.1% enrollment growth resulted from enrolling low-income children. Colorado officials report that the state did not change its application or redetermination processes or parameters of eligibility during FY 2004. They indicate that the economy was the most significant cause of this enrollment increase.<sup>9</sup>

Virginia also had a 6.1% increase in enrollment for this same time period. Virginia also indicates that they did not make any changes to their enrollment processes in this time period. Virginia in FY 2004 ended 12 months of extended Transitional Medical Assistance that was expected to impact about 3,400 individuals.<sup>10</sup> Virginia's overall enrollment grew despite almost no increase in the number of aged, blind and disabled beneficiaries.

Maine had a 4.9% increase in enrollment in this six-month period. While the greatest increase was in the number of childless adults covered under Maine's HIFA waiver, there was enrollment growth in every category. The smallest rate of growth was for the aged, blind and disabled categories.

## Medicaid Enrollment Trends by Category

In addition to tracking trends in total enrollment, the study also collected data to show the distribution of enrollees by the category of eligibility. However, the categories used for

enrollment reports differ from state to state, and some states did not provide data for all eligibility categories. Thus the number of states providing data varies by eligibility group, ranging from 14 to 44 states.<sup>11</sup>

The number of states for which data were available is shown below, by enrollment category:

- Children versus Adults (31 states)
- Families, Children and Pregnant Women (44 states)
- Transitional Medical Assistance (14 states)
- Poverty-Related Medicaid Enrollees (22 states)
- Aged and Disabled (44 states)

Data for these groups can illuminate enrollment trends and provide important information about specific states. It is important to emphasize that the data reflect the experience of only the reporting states, not the nation as a whole.

### ***Children Versus Adults (31 States)***

Medicaid continues to offer health coverage to increasing numbers of children. Recent changes in Medicaid eligibility policy and processes have directly and indirectly affected the number of children enrolled in Medicaid. During implementation of welfare reform in 1997 and 1998, some families and children lost eligibility for Medicaid when they left welfare.

Beginning in 1998, many children gained eligibility for Medicaid (or SCHIP) in eligibility categories specifically designed to cover children in low-income families. Most states conducted outreach activities as part of the implementation of their SCHIP programs that resulted in the identification of children that were eligible for Medicaid. In addition many states simplified their Medicaid application and re-enrollment processes and some states removed eligibility barriers such as asset tests. With the economic downturn, outreach was curtailed in most states.

By FY 2004 most states were no longer conducting active outreach activities and in a few states some of the simplification strategies had been reversed.

For this report states were asked to provide data on enrollment of children versus adults if such information was available from existing reports. Thirty-one states provided data for both June 1997 and June 2004 (Table 2). These thirty-one states represent 72% of total US Medicaid enrollment as of June 2004. (See notes for this table in Appendix B.)

For these 31 states, children represented a slightly greater share of Medicaid enrollees in June 2004 (54.1%) than they did seven years earlier in June 1997 (53.5%).

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<sup>11</sup> Twenty-seven states, representing 51% of total U.S. Medicaid enrollment, provided data on the number of low-income Medicare beneficiaries. These individuals represented 2.7% of enrollees for these 27 states. Extrapolation of this information to all states would indicate that there are about 1.1 million enrollees in this group. See Appendix A for more information.

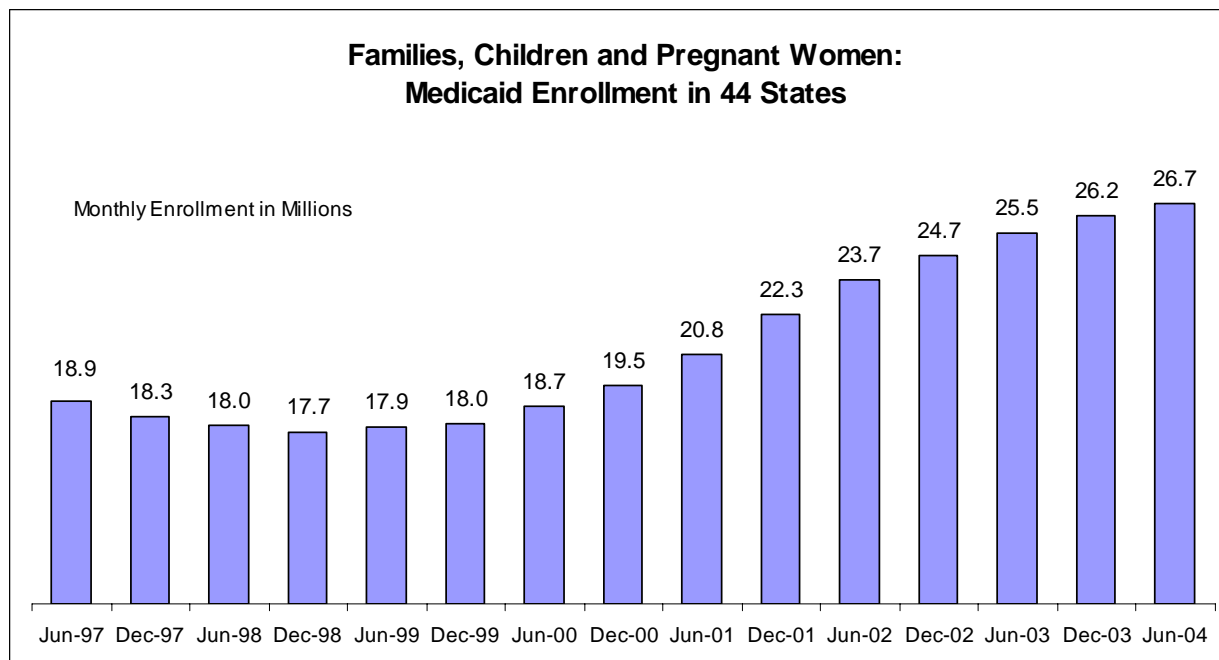

### **Families, Children and Pregnant Women (44 States)**

Forty-four states provided data on the number of children, parents, and pregnant women enrolled in Medicaid. Enrollment in this category increased by 1.2 million over the year ending in June 2004, and by more than 475,000 from December 2003 to June 2004. Each was a substantial increase in enrollment, but each also was the smallest increase since the year 1999.

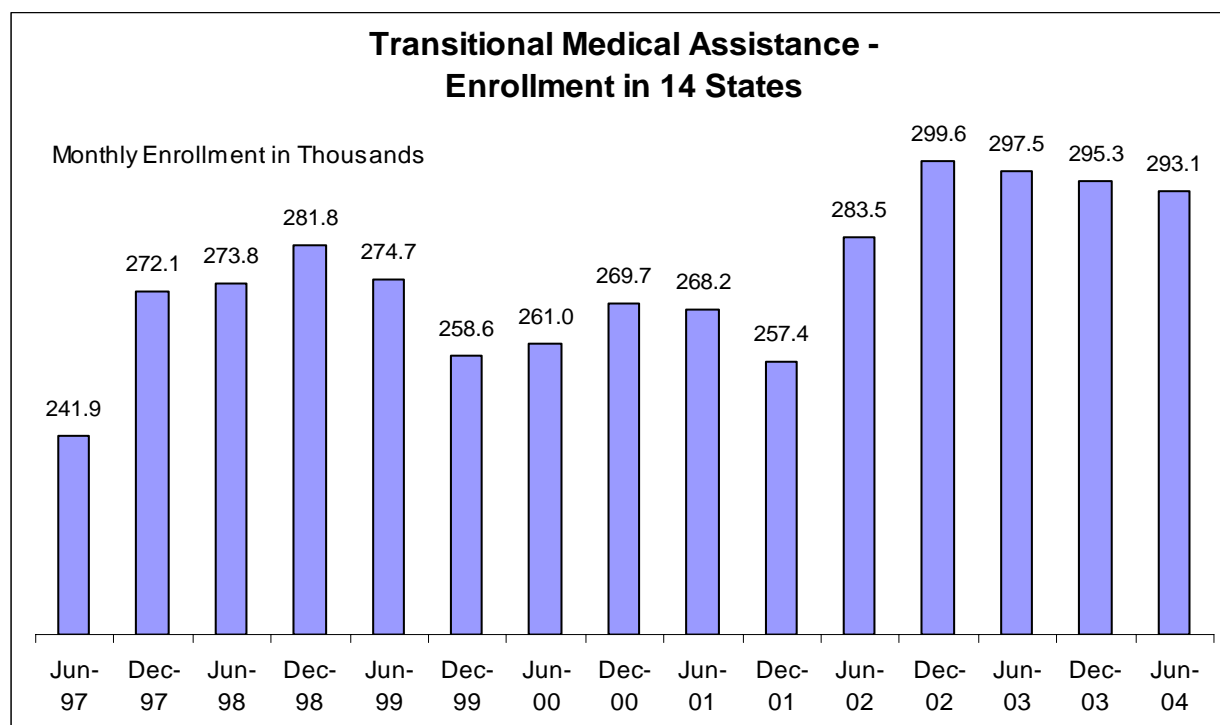

### ***Transitional Medical Assistance (14 States)***

This Medicaid category was created as part of national welfare reform to extend Medicaid eligibility temporarily for uninsured families that no longer qualified for income assistance from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program. Fourteen states provided data on trends in this enrollment group.

As shown in Figure 6 and Table 4, enrollment in this category has historically fluctuated. This fluctuation occurs for several reasons. One variable is the number of families leaving Medicaid due to increased earnings. In the early days of welfare reform, welfare caseloads were larger

and there were many more families leaving welfare and Medicaid due to increased earnings. States also made changes in their processes to better inform families with increased income of the availability of Transitional Medical Assistance (TMA) that resulted in increased TMA enrollment. Data from these fourteen states indicate significant variation in the TMA enrollment trends among the states. While total enrollment for these fourteen states decreased by 1.5% from June 2003 to June 2004, some states experienced increases as great as 177% and other saw declines of up to 27%.

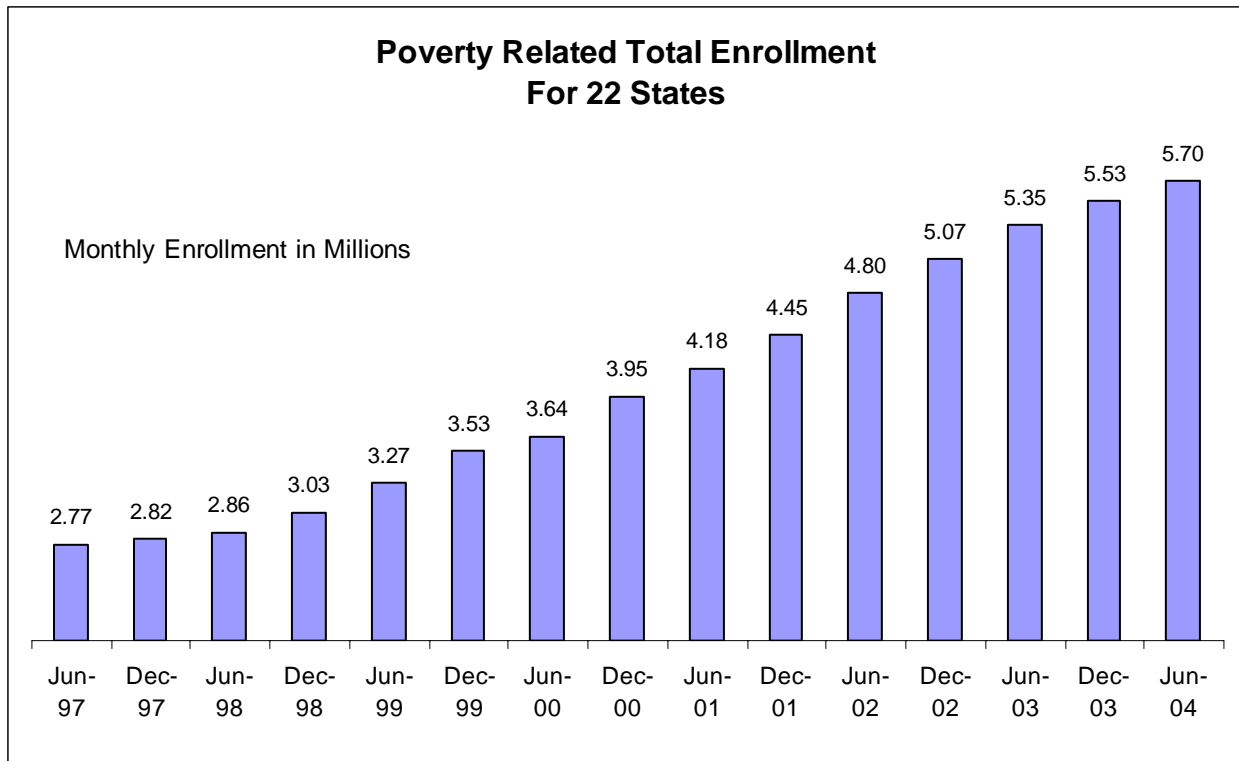
### ***Poverty-Related Medicaid Enrollment (22 States)***

This category is another subset of the larger “families, children and pregnant women” category. Poverty-related Medicaid enrollment includes low-income children and low-income pregnant women. Income levels are higher for children and pregnant women than they are for other family members, and assets are generally not considered. While there are federal minimum income thresholds for these groups, many states have chosen to expand coverage to include persons with income levels higher than the minimum thresholds. These coverage expansions are a major reason for the growth in this category.

While there were few changes in income levels for the poverty-related group, enrollment for this group grew as a result of simplified Medicaid eligibility processes in many states. These simplification efforts included shortened application forms, reduced verification requirements, and elimination of face-to-face interview requirements. In addition, most states report that when they conducted outreach programs to find children eligible for SCHIP, they found many children that were eligible for Medicaid under a poverty-related category. Many states have indicated that for every SCHIP child found through outreach, they found two to four Medicaid-eligible children. Some states found even higher proportions of Medicaid-eligible children.

Twenty-two states continue to provide data on enrollment in this category. As shown in Figure 7 and Table 5, the growth in the number of enrollees in this eligibility group has been steady over the seven-year period covered by this report. If data from these twenty-two states is indicative of trends for all states, enrollment in this group has increased at a faster rate than enrollment in the larger group of families, children and pregnant women.

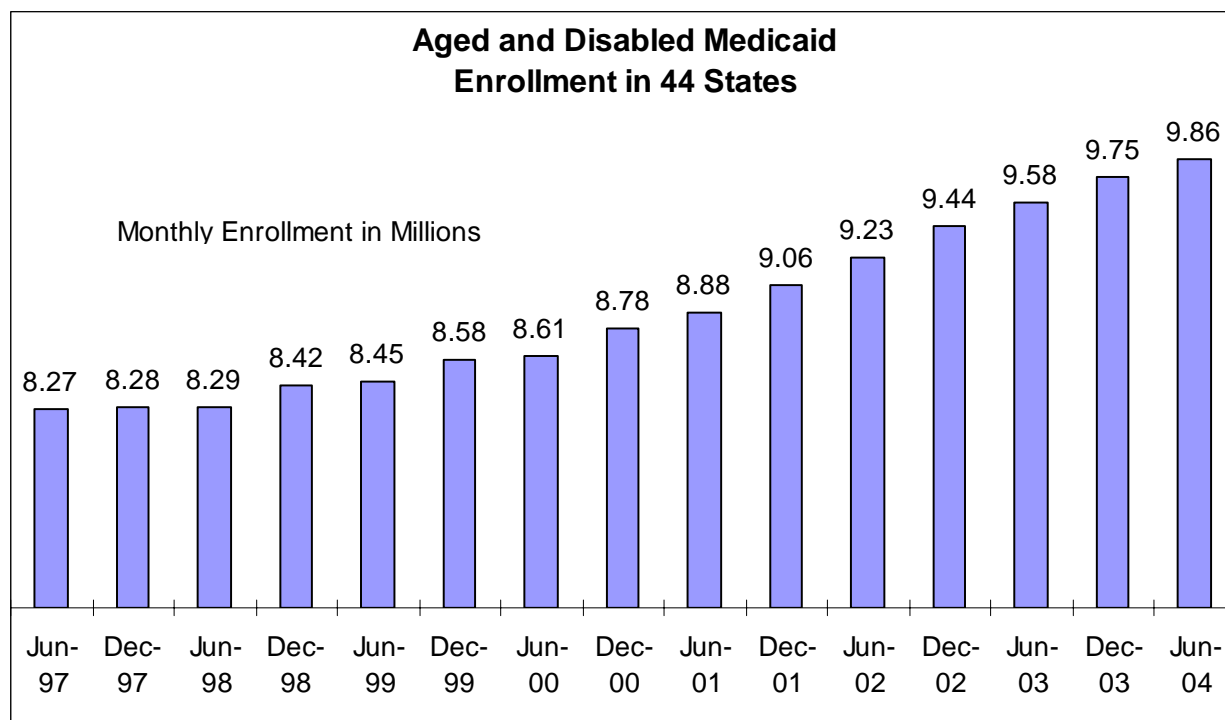

### **Aged and Disabled (44 States)**

This category includes aged, blind, and disabled individuals who receive cash assistance from the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, those with higher incomes that receive only Medicaid (including many nursing home residents and individuals enrolled in home and community services waivers), and low-income Medicare beneficiaries who receive varying levels of assistance with their Medicare premiums, deductibles, and coinsurance.<sup>12</sup>

As can be seen in Figure 8 and Table 6, aged and disabled Medicaid enrollment has increased in every six-month interval covered by this study. The number and percentage increases have been smaller than those that occurred in the families, children, and pregnant women category. However, the slower but steady growth is important to Medicaid programs because of the much

<sup>12</sup> Virtually all of the elderly and approximately one-third of the disabled Medicaid enrollees also receive assistance from the Medicare program. Some of these “dual-eligibles” have full Medicaid coverage that supplements their Medicare benefits. Others only receive Medicaid support for their Medicare premiums, deductibles and co-insurance. For the twenty-seven states with separate data, these “Medicare cost-sharing” enrollees represented about 9.8% of total aged blind and disabled enrollment in June 2004. In June 1997 these individuals represented 6.5% of total aged and disabled Medicaid enrollment. For most states these enrollees are included in the data in this report.

Connecticut data exclude QMB-only enrollees. After December 2000, Maine's QMBs are not included in totals. June 2003 data for Georgia adds about 39,000 Specified Low-Income Beneficiaries (SLMBs) and Qualified Individuals (QIs) for the first time.

higher cost of providing medical services for persons who are elderly or disabled. As shown in Table 6, the 2.8% increase in aged and disabled enrollment from June 2003 to June 2004 is smaller than the 3.8%, 4.0% and 3.1% annual growth rates in the previous June-to-June periods ending in 2003, 2002 and 2001, respectively.

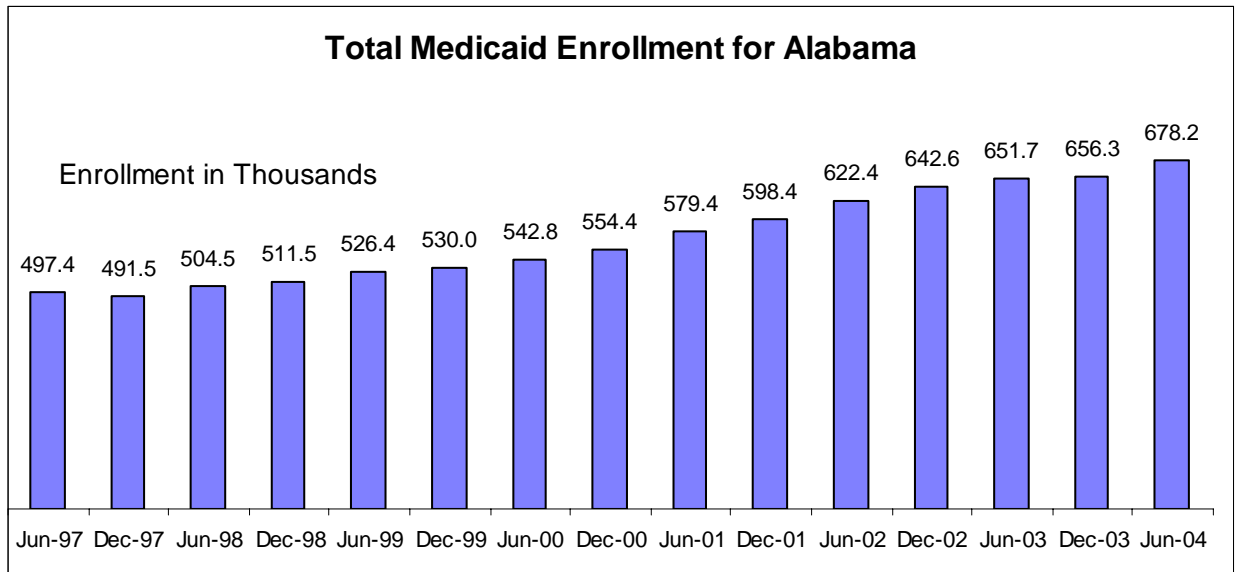

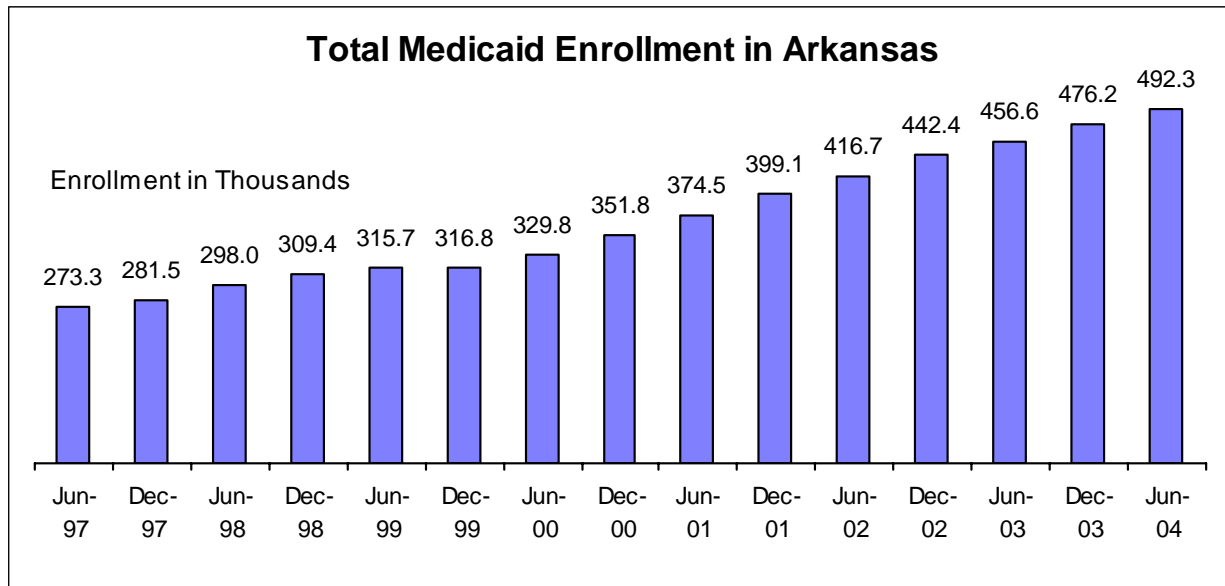

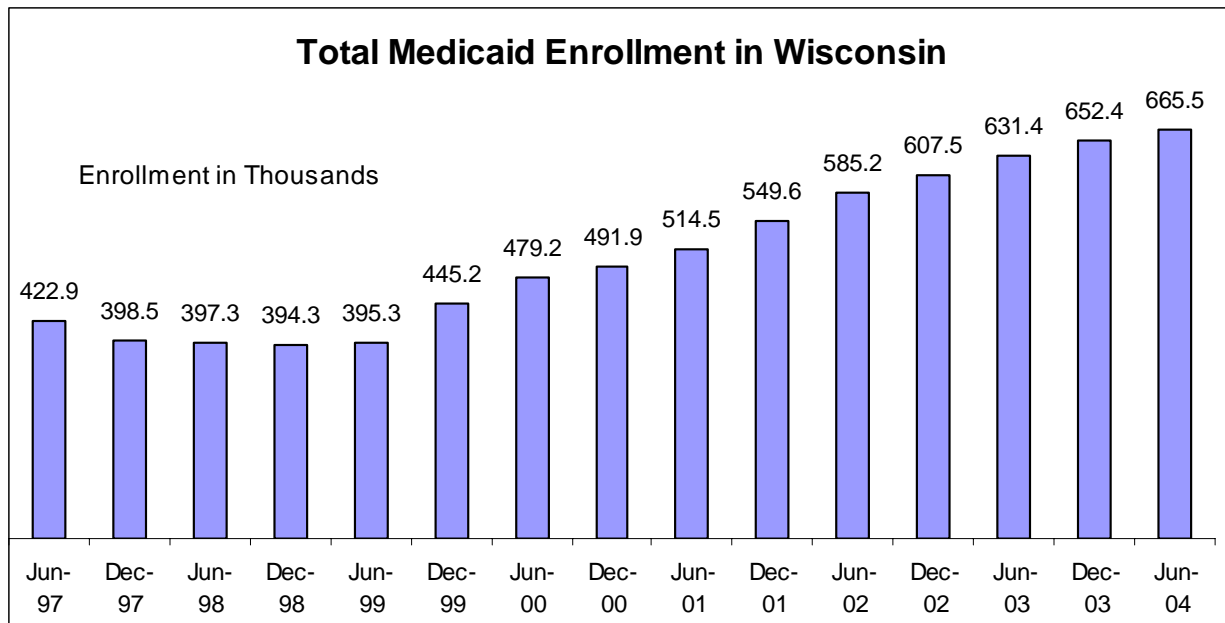

## Appendix A: Additional Data

### *The Impact of Enrollees with Limited Coverage on Overall Enrollment*

In general, Medicaid coverage is comprehensive, regardless of eligibility category. However, certain Medicaid eligibility categories provide coverage for only limited services. Enrollment in these categories has been increasing. Only some of these enrollees are included in total Medicaid enrollment numbers.

### **Family Planning Waivers**

One limited coverage category is a family planning waiver in which women are enrolled in Medicaid only for services related to family planning. The number of Medicaid family planning waivers has increased significantly in the last few years and enrollment in several of these waivers is very large. For example, as of June 2004, California's family planning waiver enrollment was nearly 1.5 million. This equates to about 53 percent of total family planning waiver enrollment in the twelve states from which we received separate data.

As of June 2004 there were eighteen states with approved family planning waivers. Florida ended its initial family planning waiver program and received authorization in December 2003 for a new waiver with more restrictive policies.

The structure and size of these programs varies significantly. Some only provide an extension of family planning services to women who lose Medicaid eligibility after being eligible for Medicaid services during pregnancy and through 60 days postpartum. The most expansive programs extend family planning services to any individual that meets the state's income criteria. These and other policy differences result in wide variations in the size of these programs.

Family planning waiver enrollees are excluded from all of the Medicaid enrollee counts in this report. Twelve states with waivers provided data on their family planning waiver enrollment.

The other states with approved family planning waivers that had been implemented as of June 2004 were Delaware, Illinois, New York, Oregon, Rhode Island and Virginia.



## **Pharmacy Plus Waivers**

As of June 2004, approved Pharmacy Plus waivers in Florida, Illinois, South Carolina and Wisconsin allowed enrollment of senior citizens in Medicaid for pharmacy services alone. The data in this report for these states excludes more than 344,000 Pharmacy Plus individuals. Maine and Vermont also have 1115 waivers that offer a pharmacy-only benefit to seniors. Maine's program had nearly 99,000 enrollees in June 2004, and Vermont indicates that about 13,000 enrollees were in this program in June 2004. Also, Tennessee has a small "grandfathered" population of Medicare beneficiaries that receives only a pharmacy benefit. These enrollees, nearly 457,000 total for all of the programs, are also not included in Medicaid enrollment data.

## **Medicare Cost-Sharing**

Another group of enrollees with limited coverage is Medicare beneficiaries who are enrolled in Medicaid for payment of some or all of their Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. While only a limited number of states have Family Planning and pharmacy waivers mentioned above, the Medicare cost-sharing categories apply in all states. For this study, separate data were available for these Medicare cost-sharing categories for only twenty-seven states, which represent 51 percent of total U.S. Medicaid enrollment in June 2004.

In these twenty-seven states, this group of enrollees has increased by 83.6 percent over the seven-year period from June 1997 to June 2004. However these enrollees represent only 2.7 percent of total June 2004 Medicaid enrollment for these states. Therefore inclusion of these individuals in the Medicaid trends does not substantially alter the change in total Medicaid enrollment from June 1997 to June 2004 nationally or for these twenty-seven states. Since it is only possible to separate the data for twenty-seven states and since the impact of this group is minimal, these limited benefit enrollees are included in the Medicaid enrollment numbers in this report.

## Appendix B: *Children versus Adults Notes*

- Family Planning enrollees are not included for any state except as noted.
- **Arizona**- July 1997 data are used in place of June 1997. Figures include state funded only enrollees. Children are those under 20.

## **Appendix C: Study Methodology and Data Issues**

This study is based on data provided by each of the fifty states and the District of Columbia. Health Management Associates asked each state to provide the internal reports they use to track enrollment in the program. Each state's report included total enrollment, and enrollment in certain eligibility categories. Report categories are not standardized across states. Where it was possible to do so, the state enrollment data were grouped to further examine trends in specific Medicaid eligibility categories.

The data tables and graphs in this document present "point-in-time" monthly Medicaid enrollment counts for the months of June and December of each year from June 1997 through June 2004. The data were provided to Health Management Associates by each state Medicaid program between November 2004 and March 2005.

To provide timely data and not overly burden state agency staff, states were asked to provide "off-the-shelf" reports on Medicaid enrollment. In other words, these are generally the same reports states use for their own purposes. Since each state uses different categories in internal enrollment reports it is not possible to track enrollment detail for all fifty states and the District of Columbia. This report provides information on enrollment trends for categories of enrollees across as many states as possible, given the limitations of the source data.

### **Point-in-Time Values**

National reports issued by CMS also use data provided by state Medicaid agencies. CMS reports show the total number of persons "ever-enrolled" in Medicaid during a quarterly or annual period. The "ever-enrolled" measure of Medicaid enrollment used in CMS reports differs from the "point-in-time" measure of Medicaid enrollment used here. CMS reports show the unduplicated count of persons enrolled at any time and for any length of time during the indicated reporting period. For example, in annual CMS reports, a person enrolled in Medicaid for one month of the year and a person enrolled for the entire year are each counted as one enrollee for that year. In contrast, the data reported in this report show enrollment in specific months. Given that each month individuals enroll and disenroll, the enrollment count in any specific month will always be less than the number ever-enrolled during a twelve month period. The extent to which the monthly number is less than the "ever-enrolled" number depends on the extent of monthly enrollment, disenrollment and re-enrollment activity.

The point-in-time count of enrollees allows analysis of shorter-term trends in enrollment data. By definition, the point-in-time monthly count of enrollees will be less than the unduplicated annual number of enrollees.

### **Common Categorization of Enrollees**

The initial expectation was that it would be possible to compare trends in most of the states for all of the categories used in the cross-state trends. As the data were received from the states, we found that none of these categories existed in every state.

### **Level of Data Detail**

A related issue is the great variety in the level of detail we received from the states. The number of distinct categories ranged from two to 166, with the exception of two states for which only totals were available for the first two years of data. The states with the greatest numbers of categories provided us with algorithms used by the state to aggregate the data. HMA applied these algorithms to the detailed data to create aggregations that are more meaningful.

States with the fewest categories were generally the ones we could not readily compare with other states.

### **Data Completeness**

As a result of the processing time and possibility of retroactive eligibility, counts of Medicaid enrollment for a specific month may change over the following several months. The data in this study are based on state reports usually produced two to five months following the indicated month. Effort was made to use reports that reflect retroactive eligibility where they exist, and, for each period, to use reports that reflect the same

adjustments. Nevertheless, it is possible that additional changes may have occurred subsequent to the counts provided for our use in this study.

### **Variation in Definitions of Medicaid Enrollment**

States vary in how they count enrollment for a given month for their own purposes. Some states count the number of enrollees as of the first day of the month and never adjust the report. Some states count the number of enrollees as of the last day of the month and never adjust the report. Data for some states also include “retroactive” eligibles, i.e., individuals whose Medicaid eligibility is established at a later date, but whose coverage is retroactive to a prior point in time. When a person applies for Medicaid, federal processing standards allow the state up to 45 days to complete the eligibility determination process. In this process, for some Medicaid categories it is possible for a state to look at the period immediately prior to the date of application and determine whether eligibility criteria were met for a period of as many as 90 days prior to the date of application (and if eligible, to cover medical bills incurred in this period.)

States also vary in their treatment of “spend-down” enrollees. Some states include in their enrollment counts persons with excess income that qualify to “spend-down” to Medicaid eligibility whether or not they have incurred sufficient medical costs to become eligible for Medicaid in that month. Other states only include those individuals that have met their “spend-down” requirement. Since a primary goal of this report is to identify trends, these variations have been deemed acceptable, as long as a given state does not change its methodology over time.

The counts provided by the states reflect all persons with Medicaid eligibility for each month. Different eligibility categories have different levels of Medicaid coverage. Every person with Medicaid coverage was counted as an enrollee with the exception of family planning waiver enrollees and pharmacy plus waiver enrollees. No adjustment was made for other persons who are enrolled in Medicaid categories with less than full coverage. Therefore the count of persons on Medicaid includes a small number of individuals that are only covered by Medicaid for emergency services and persons with Medicare and Medicaid dual eligibility who are enrolled as Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries (QMBs), Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries (SLMBs) or Qualified Individuals (QIs) for whom Medicaid only pays a portion of Medicare premiums, co-payments and deductibles. (See Appendix A for a more detailed discussion of enrollees with limited benefits).

To the extent possible, persons in state-only health coverage programs that are not funded by the federal Medicaid program are excluded in the count of Medicaid enrollees.

While Health Management Associates asked the state Medicaid agencies for “off-the-shelf” reports used by the states to track Medicaid enrollment, some states chose to produce special reports for use in this report. In some of the states the single state agency for Medicaid does not determine Medicaid eligibility, and data were obtained from the eligibility agency.
