

Iraq top issue, followed by health care; immigration and gas prices on the rise

Consistent with our last election tracking survey in March, the conflict in Iraq continues to dominate the list of issues that are important to the public, with 43 percent saying Iraq is one of the top issues they want to hear the presidential candidates discuss. Iraq continues to be the number one issue for self-reported Republicans, Democrats, and independents alike. Behind Iraq, health care continues to be the second most-mentioned issue, with 21 percent of the public saying they want to hear about it from candidates.

Health care continues to rank second for Democrats and independents, but in June immigration moved slightly ahead of health care for Republicans. That change in issue rank for Republicans is reflective of a broader trend, with a larger share of the public overall mentioning immigration in June (18 percent) compared to March (9 percent), most likely as a result of the recent discussions about immigration taking place in Congress. The economy ranked fourth behind immigration, mentioned by 13 percent of the public, and was closely followed by mentions of gas prices and energy issues (12 percent, up sharply from 3 percent in March). Terrorism and national security (mentioned by 7 percent) rounded out the list of top issues the public wants to hear about from candidates.

Within health care, focus is on cost and coverage

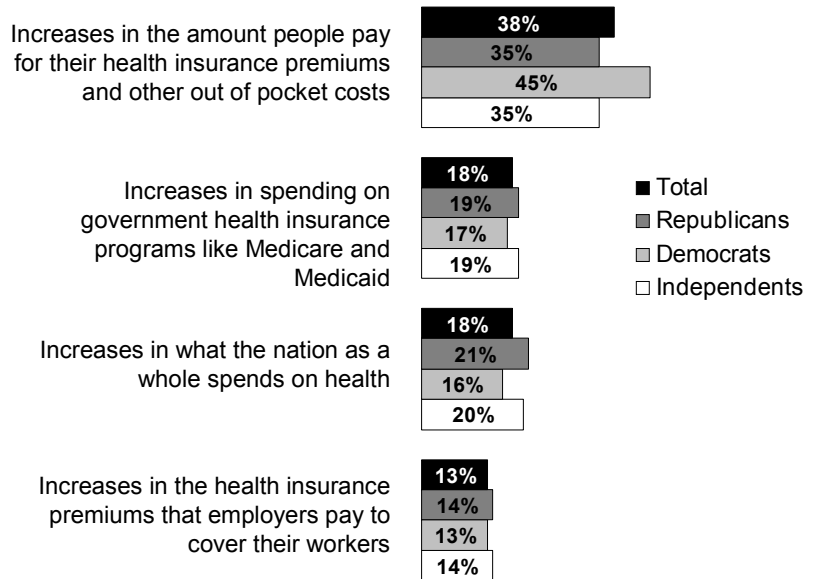
When asked specifically about the *health care* issues they'd like to hear the presidential candidates talk about, expanding coverage for the uninsured and health care costs both top the list. When respondents are asked to choose from a list of options, Democrats are more likely to choose expanding coverage for the uninsured, and Republicans are more likely to choose reducing health care costs, while independents are more split. These results are consistent with our March tracking poll.

Health care cost concerns centered around out-of-pocket expenses

We asked people what concerns them most when thinking about rising health care costs. For a plurality of the public (38 percent), their biggest health care cost-related concern has to do with increases in the amount people pay out of their own pockets for health care and insurance. This is somewhat higher among Democrats (45 percent) than among Republicans and independents (35 percent for both). Behind out-of-pocket costs, equal shares say they are most concerned about increased spending on government health insurance programs and increases in what the nation as a whole spends on health (18 percent each), while somewhat fewer are most worried about increases in insurance premiums paid by employers (13 percent).

Democrats and independents most interested in hearing about big push on uninsured

Consistent with our March tracking survey, more than half the public in June say they would like to see candidates propose a major new health reform plan that would provide almost universal coverage, even if it involved a substantial increase in spending, while one in five say they would like to see a less expensive, more limited plan, and 17 percent say they would like candidates to propose keepings things as they are now. Interest in major health reform legislation varies greatly across political parties, with Democrats (72 percent) twice as likely as Republicans (36 percent) to say they would want a candidate to propose a costly push for greatly expanded coverage (independents are in between, with 49 percent).

Few people are likely to vote solely based on health

As with most issues, a small group of the public (13 percent) say they would *only* vote for a presidential candidate who shares their views on health care. The vast majority (68 percent) say they would consider a candidate's position on health care as one of many important factors in their vote for president, and one in eight (13 percent) say they would not see health care as a major issue in their vote. Results on this question were similar for Democrats, Republicans, and independents.

Still no single candidate who stands out on health (Clinton gets most recognition among Democrats, but Obama inching up)

With the first presidential primaries more than six months away, most people still don't know or can't name a candidate who best represents their own views on health care, or say that *no* candidate represents their views. However, the share that is able to name a candidate who comes closest to their views increased somewhat, from 32 to 41 percent between March and June. In fact, a majority of Democrats (58 percent) now name a candidate who shares their views on health.

Hillary Clinton remains the candidate who gets the most mention in this question, with 17 percent of the public saying she best represents their health care views, followed by Barack Obama with 9 percent. Among Democrats, a third say Senator Clinton is the candidate who comes closest to their views (compared with 27 percent in March), followed by Senator Obama with 15 percent (up from 8 percent in March), and former Senator John Edwards with 4 percent. Since the earlier survey, Senator Obama announced his health proposal and Senator Clinton announced her plan on health care costs. Edwards announced his health reform plan prior to the March survey. Among Republicans, nearly one in ten (9 percent) name former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani as the candidate who best represents their views on health care, followed by former Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney (6 percent, up from 2 percent in March), and Senator John McCain.

Similarly, most people don't know or can't name a candidate who is placing the *biggest emphasis* on health, or say that *no* candidate is placing a big emphasis on health care issues (57 percent), although the share able to name a candidate again increased somewhat between March and June (from 34 to 43 percent). Again, Clinton is the only candidate to score double digits, with 23 percent saying she is the candidate most focused on health care. The share naming Barack Obama as the candidate most focused on health increased somewhat between the two tracking polls, but he is still behind Clinton in terms of perception as a health-focused candidate.

Methodology

This *Kaiser Health Tracking Poll: Election 2008*, the second in a series, was designed and analyzed by researchers at the Kaiser Family Foundation. A nationally representative random sample of 1,203 adults was interviewed by telephone between May 31-June 5, 2007. The margin of sampling error for the survey is plus or minus 3 percentage points; for results based on subgroups, the sampling error is higher.

March trends are from the first survey in the *Kaiser Health Tracking Poll: Election 2008* series, and are based on a nationally representative sample of 1,233 adults interviewed March 8-13, 2007 (margin of sampling error plus or minus 3 percentage points).
