2008 Update on Consumers' Views of Patient Safety and Quality Information

Methodology

The 2008 Update on Consumers' Views of Patient Safety and Quality Information survey was conducted by telephone from July 29 to August 6, 2008, among a randomly selected nationally representative sample of 1,517 respondents 18 years of age and older. Interviews were conducted as part of the Kaiser Health Tracking Poll: Election 2008 series. Telephone interviews were completed by Princeton Survey Research Associates.

The margin of sampling error for the overall survey is plus or minus three percentage points. For results based on subsets of respondents the margin of error is higher. Note that sampling error is only one of many potential sources of error in this or any other public opinion poll. Values less than 0.5% are indicated by an asterisk (*). "VOL" indicates that a response was volunteered by respondent, not an explicitly offered choice. Due to rounding, percentages may not add to 100.
