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Executive Summary

Since its enactment in 1965 as companion legislation to Medicare, Medicaid has evolved from a program providing federal financing to states to support health coverage for their welfare population to a federal and state partnership that now provides health and long-term coverage to millions of low-income Americans. It has become the nation's largest health care program both in terms of enrollment and spending, with children and families making up the vast majority of program enrollment and the elderly and disabled accounting for the bulk of program spending.

Medicaid's guarantee of federal financing that matches state spending enables states to respond to losses of private health insurance attributable to unemployment and rising health insurance premiums. When unemployment rose during the recent economic downturn, more individuals qualified for Medicaid coverage as incomes declined and access to employer-sponsored insurance became more limited. This contributed to the recent growth in Medicaid enrollment described in this report.

The Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured has tracked national and state Medicaid enrollment trends using monthly enrollment data since the fall of 2000 using data provided by each state and the District of Columbia. These monthly data provide a timely and reliable basis for following Medicaid enrollment trends in the United States.¹

Key Findings

Medicaid enrollment continued its four-year growth trend in calendar year 2002, ending with 39.6 million persons enrolled in December 2002.² Enrollment grew by 2.9 million, or 7.9 percent, from December 2001 to December of 2002.

The 2002 increase was lower than the increase from December 2000 to December 2001, however, when enrollment increased by 3.3 million persons, or 9.9 percent. Enrollment growth began to moderate during the 2002 period, as the rate of growth slowed from 4.6 percent for the six-months ending in June 2002 to 3.1 percent for the six months ending in December 2002. Enrollment growth was greatest for families, children and pregnant women. Enrollment for this group increased by 14.1 percent in the year ending in December 2001, and by 10.3 percent in the year ending in December 2002.

Notably, while the numbers are smaller, enrollment of persons who are elderly or disabled increased at an accelerating pace throughout the period of this study. Growth in these populations has a significant impact on Medicaid program spending, as other research has demonstrated that these populations accounted for 60% of the growth in Medicaid spending between 2000 and 2002 due to their high use of both acute and long-term care services. Annual elderly and disabled enrollment increases were: 1998, 1.7 percent; 1999, 2.0 percent; 2000, 2.3 percent; 2001, 3.2 percent; 2002, 3.9 percent.

Total Medicaid Enrollment in the 50 States and D.C.

The Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured has tracked national and state Medicaid enrollment trends using monthly enrollment data provided by each state and the District of Columbia since the fall of 2000.⁴ This report extends the data series to include Medicaid enrollment for each June and December from 1997 to 2002. These data provide a timely and reliable basis for following Medicaid enrollment trends in the United States.⁵

This report focuses on the annual changes for calendar years, represented by December-to-December changes. In December 2002, total Medicaid enrollment in the United States reached over 39.6 million persons⁶ (Figure 1).



The December 2002 enrollment was an increase of 2.9 million Medicaid enrollees from December 2001, or an annual increase of 7.9% (Figure 2 and Tables 1a and 1b).

Figure 2 shows the trend in the annual rate of change in Medicaid enrollment for the five calendar years covered by this report. From December 1997 to December 1998, declines in total enrollment early in the year were partially offset by increases in the second half of the year, with a net annual decline in total Medicaid enrollment of 0.2%. The decline in the early part of calendar 1998 was the final segment of a three-year downward trend in total enrollment that began in 1996 and is generally associated with the robust economy and issues related to states' implementation of welfare reform.⁷



Calendar years 1999 and 2000 were marked by moderate growth of 3.8 percent and 4.9 percent in Medicaid enrollment as states implemented changes in eligibility processes to make it easier for those leaving welfare to stay on Medicaid and as many states expanded eligibility, particularly for children. Most states implemented the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) in 1998. States conducted outreach efforts designed to let low-income families know about SCHIP as part of their program implementation. Many states reported that these outreach efforts also helped identify and enroll many children that qualified for Medicaid coverage.

In calendar year 2001 total U.S. Medicaid enrollment increased by 9.9%, the most rapid growth rate in a decade. State Medicaid directors have indicated that the economic

downturn and the continued case-finding effect of SCHIP were primary contributors to increased Medicaid enrollment during their 2001 and 2002 fiscal years.8

As indicated in Figure 2, the 7.9 percent rate of increase for calendar year 2002 is still substantial, but represents moderation from the even larger increase in 2001. The slowing rate of enrollment growth at the end of this period is evident in Figure 3, which shows the trends in six-month increments.



The slower rates of increase for calendar 2002 are in part attributable to changes in state Medicaid policy as some states reduced Medicaid eligibility or increased Medicaid enrollment requirements during state FY 2002 or the beginning of state FY 2003 in response to revenue declines and state fiscal difficulties.⁹

Table 1a shows state-by-state Medicaid enrollment counts from December 1997 to December 2002, and Table 1b shows annual percentage changes for each calendar year from 1998 to 2002.



The state-by-state experience for the last six months of calendar 2002 is shown in Figure 4. Across all 50 states and the District of Columbia, total Medicaid enrollment increased by 3.1% over the six-month period from June to December 2002. However,

there was wide variation across states. Eight states and DC reported enrollment declines that ranged from 0.2% to 4.5%. Declines in several of these states can be attributed to specific policy changes; six of these nine states reduced eligibility for various categories of Medicaid enrollees in FY 2002 or early FY 2003: Indiana, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New Jersey, Ohio, and Oklahoma. At the same time, total enrollment increased in the other 42 states, including four states with six-month increases of 10 percent or more: Arizona, Utah, North Dakota and Maine.

Medicaid Enrollment Trends by Category

This report tracks trends in total enrollment and also in five selected Medicaid eligibility groups, based on data provided by the states. States were asked to provide data for this report that showed the distribution of enrollees by the category of eligibility, and whenever possible they did so. However, the categories used for enrollment reports differed from state to state, and some states provided only a summary number for total enrollment.

All states and DC provided data on total enrollment, but data were not provided by all states for all eligibility categories. The number of states for which data were available for each eligibility group ranged from 15 to 44. Data for these groups are useful to suggest enrollment trends and provide important information reflecting the specific states. It is important to emphasize that data from reporting states do not necessarily reflect the experience of all states for these groups.

The groups of enrollees and the number of states for which data were available are:

- Children versus Adults (31 states)
- Families, Children and Pregnant Women (44 states)
 - Transitional Medical Assistance (15 states)
 - Poverty-Related Medicaid Enrollees (22 states)
- Aged and Disabled (44 states)

The number of enrollment groups has been reduced from prior reports. With the delinking of Medicaid from welfare at the time of welfare reform in 1997, Medicaid eligibility based on receipt of cash assistance from AFDC or TANF was replaced with a category of Low Income Families (LIF). TANF recipients and families with similar economic circumstances all qualify for Medicaid under LIF. As the Medicaid and TANF programs have been further de-linked organizationally and operationally in the states, fewer states track the number of Medicaid enrollees in a way that indicates that they do or do not receive cash assistance from TANF or SSI. As a result, in this report (in contrast to previous reports in this series), we do not include separate tables on TANF, Medicaid only, or a comparison over time of the proportion of Medicaid enrollees receiving cash assistance.

Children Versus Adults (31 States)

One of the important trends in recent years has been the increasing numbers of children with Medicaid coverage. Recent changes in Medicaid eligibility policy and processes have directly and indirectly impacted the number of children enrolled in Medicaid. Some families and children lost eligibility for Medicaid during implementation of welfare reform in 1997 and 1998. In many states the processes initially used to close welfare cases resulted in simultaneous loss of Medicaid enrollment, without any assessment of

whether any or all family members still qualified for Medicaid under a different category. ¹⁰ Later, many more gained eligibility for Medicaid (or SCHIP) in eligibility categories specifically designed to cover children in low-income families.

For this report states were asked to provide data on enrollment of children versus adults if such information was available from existing reports. A total of thirty-one states provided data for both December 1997 and December 2002 (Table 2). These thirty-one states have 71% of total Medicaid enrollment as of December 2002.

For these thirty-one states the number of children on Medicaid declined from June 1997 to June 1998 and then began to increase. As discussed in the next section of this report, this enrollment increase parallels several policy and procedural factors: less restrictive enrollment processes, liberalization of eligibility standards, outreach initiatives

for SCHIP or for both SCHIP and Medicaid, and (in some states) a review of Medicaid cases closed due to welfare reform to find those that should have retained Medicaid eligibility.

In these thirty-one states the number of children enrolled in Medicaid increased from 11.6 million in December 1997 to 15.6 million in December 2002, an increase of 34.2%. The formula of these states, child enrolled comprised 55.1% of all Medicaid enrolled in December 2002, an increase of 2.2 percentage points from 52.9% in December 1997.

Families, Children and Pregnant Women (44 States)

Forty-four states provided data on Medicaid enrollment of families, children and pregnant women. Four sets of categories comprise this grouping, including

- (1) low-income families: adult and child enrollees who are receiving TANF cash assistance and low-income families with similar incomes not receiving TANF cash assistance;
- (2) certain poverty-related groups: Pregnant women and children with incomes that are higher than the income limits for low-income families but are below specified income limits (usually set at a specified percentage of the federal poverty level);
- (3) children enrolled in Medicaid-expansion SCHIP programs; and
- (4) adults and children enrolled in Transitional Medicaid Assistance (TMA).

A continuing public policy interest focuses on the net result of two opposing trends in this grouping of enrollees. Welfare reform was associated with significant declines in Medicaid enrollment of families and children who were also receiving TANF cash assistance. During the same time period in which TANF-related family and child enrollment declined, many states made an active effort to enroll low-income families, children and pregnant women in Medicaid. These efforts included expansions of eligibility, simplification of application processes and eligibility requirements, and special outreach programs. States found that outreach initiatives to find and enroll children in SCHIP programs also identified children that qualified for Medicaid.

Some of these outreach initiatives also targeted pregnant women. In addition, states made efforts to insure that families leaving welfare were reviewed to see if they qualified to stay on Medicaid. Most families leaving welfare for work are eligible for Transitional Medical Assistance, and some families leaving welfare for work have incomes that remain below the income limits for the Medicaid low-income families group. However, the system and policy changes necessary to assure the continuation of appropriate Medicaid coverage were difficult and time-consuming, and many eligible individuals lost Medicaid coverage in the period immediately after welfare reform was implemented. As a result, the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services directed state Medicaid agencies to "identify individuals and families who have been terminated improperly and reinstate them to Medicaid". 12

The forty-four states that reported on enrollment trend for families and children have 88.5% of the total December 2002 Medicaid enrollment for all States. Total Medicaid

enrollment in all categories for 50 states and DC increased by 28.9% over the five years from December 1997 to December 2002. For these forty-four states total Medicaid enrollment for all categories increased by 31.2% from December 1997 to December 2002, indicating that overall enrollment grew somewhat more rapidly in these states than in the other seven jurisdictions.



As shown in Figure 5 and Table 3, the enrollment of families, children, and pregnant women continued to increase at a rapid pace during 2002; the annual rate of increase was10.3%, which represented a slowing from the 14.1% increase during 2001. In fact, as can be calculated from Figure 5, the 1.1 million-person increase in the last six months of 2002 was the smallest semi-annual growth since the last six months of 2000.

On a state-by-state basis, only two states, Oregon and Virginia, had a decline in enrollment in this category from December 1997 to December 2002 (Table 3). During this same time period, aggregate Medicaid enrollment of families and children grew by 37.8% for all forty-four states. Two states, Arizona and South Carolina had enrollment growth in this category in excess of 100% and an additional seven states (Arkansas, Idaho, Louisiana, Mississippi, Nevada, Oklahoma, and Wisconsin) had enrollment growth in excess of 75%.

Transitional Medical Assistance (15 States)

This category was added to the Medicaid program in conjunction with welfare reform. When Low-Income Families, including TANF recipients, lose Medicaid eligibility due to increased earnings, those families can still receive Medicaid. In general they can receive up to an additional 12 months of Medicaid, although some states have extended this coverage for a longer period of time. Recipients that lose Medicaid eligibility due to increased child support can also retain Medicaid coverage for an additional 4 months.

Initial implementation of this program was problematic. Evidence indicates that in some cases many families had TANF Medicaid cases closed without any exploration of TMA

eligibility. In addition, many families that were only on Medicaid and experienced increases in income were not offered the option of continued Medicaid as TMA enrollees. Over time states improved their TMA processes. However, as welfare reform implementation matured there were fewer TANF cases, and therefore fewer TANF case closures with the potential for TMA enrollment.

Figure 6 shows resurgence in TMA enrollment in recent months, based on data from 15 states. After peaking at 351,900 in June 1999, TMA enrollment in these fifteen states generally declined on average until December 2001. From December 2001 to December 2002 TMA enrollment increased by 14.2% in these fifteen states. Nevertheless, total TMA enrollment in these states still remained below the number in this category throughout calendar 1999 and 2000.



Table 4 shows that there is significant variation in TMA trends among these 15 states. From December 1997 to December 2002 the rate of change in TMA enrollment ranges from a decrease of 69.3% in New Mexico to an increase of 252.7% in North Dakota.

On a state-by-state basis, from December 2001 to December 2002 TMA enrollment increased in ten of the fifteen states that reported on TMA enrollment. While some states have more recently reduced the length of optional TMA assistance, that change did not occur in any of these fifteen states prior to December 2002.

These fifteen states represent only 19% of total US Medicaid enrollment, so these trends may not be reflective of all state Medicaid programs.

Poverty-Related Medicaid Enrollees (22 States)

This category is also a subset of the "Families and Children and Pregnant Women" group. Enrollees in this group are low-income children and pregnant women. Federal law requires that states provide Medicaid to low-income children and pregnant women based on family income as a percentage of the poverty level. Eligibility for adults other than women who are pregnant is generally based on welfare income standards, meaning that eligibility is generally more restrictive for non-pregnant parents. The specific federally mandated minimum income eligibility levels as a percentage of the federal poverty level (FPL) are:

- Pregnant women: 133 percent of the FPL, including a period of two months post partum.
- Children ages birth to first birthday: 133 percent of the FPL
- Children from first birthday to 6th birthday: 133 percent of the FPL
- Children from 6th birthday to 19th birthday: 100 percent of the FPL

Many states provide Medicaid assistance for children and pregnant women at higher income levels than the minimum federal requirements. In 2002, 12 states covered pregnant women up to 200 percent of the FPL or above, and 41 states covered children (through Medicaid or SCHIP) at 200 percent of the FPL or above. Near the end of the 1990's many states increased income thresholds, especially for children, and reduced paperwork requirements and otherwise simplified the eligibility process for these

enrollees. At the same time, increased outreach efforts associated with the implementation of SCHIP programs helped identify and enroll low-income children that qualified for Medicaid in many states. (A few states with Medicaid-expansion SCHIP programs also include these enrollees in the Poverty-Related group. See Appendix D.)

Enrollment Trends: As shown in Figure 7, and Table 5 enrollment in this category has increased in every period from June 1997 to December 2002, based on data from twenty-two states. Table 5 shows that from December 2001 to December 2002 enrollment in this category increased by 13.7% for these twenty-two states, a larger annual rate of increase than occurred in 2000 or 2001.

Over the five year period from December 1997 to December 2002 enrollment in this category increased by 82.1% for these twenty-two states. In nine of these twenty-two states (Alaska, Florida, Idaho, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, and New Jersey), enrollment in this category more than doubled between December 1997 and December 2002. Enrollment decreased in only one state, North Dakota (Table 5). This decrease occurred because North Dakota expanded coverage under the Low-Income families category so that many individuals that would previously have been covered under the Poverty-Related groups were now eligible under the Low Income Families category.



Aged and Disabled Medicaid Enrollees (44 States)

This category includes low-income individuals enrolled in Medicaid who are age 65 and older, blind or have a disability. Some of these individuals received cash assistance from the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, but many are enrolled only in Medicaid and not receiving cash assistance. Virtually all of the elderly and approximately one-third of the disabled Medicaid enrollees are also enrolled in the Medicare program. Some individuals enrolled in both Medicaid and Medicare don't receive full Medicaid benefits, but receive assistance only with Medicare premiums, copayments and deductibles. For individuals enrolled in both Medicaid and Medicare, Medicare is the primary source of payment for those health care services that are covered by Medicare. Medicaid programs incur significant costs for these "dual eligibles" for pharmacy services and long term care services (such as nursing home care) that are not covered by Medicare. Indeed, other studies have shown the dual eligibles account for 35 percent to 40 percent of all Medicaid costs. 15

Forty-four states were able to provide information about enrollment trends for aged and disabled Medicaid enrollees. These forty-four states have 88.5% of the total December 2002 Medicaid enrollment for all States.

As illustrated in Figure 8 and Table 6, enrollment in this aged and disabled category increased steadily, albeit at a slower pace relative to the growth among families and children. The rate of enrollment increase for these aged and disabled category rose at an increasing rate in each annual period from December 1997 to December 2002. The annual rates of increase were 1.7% for 1998, 2.0% for 1999, 2.3% for 2000, 3.2% for 2001 and 3.9% for 2002. The 3.9% increase from December 2001 to December 2002 exceeds the two-year increase from December 1997 to December 1999.



The aggregate enrollment increase in this category was 13.7% from December 1997 to December 2002. This was well below the 38.7% increase in enrollment of families and children and pregnant women over the same five-year period. However growth in enrollment among the aged and disabled has a disproportionate impact on Medicaid expenditures because of the high cost of serving these populations. The overall ratio of costs per Medicaid aged and disabled Medicaid enrollee is about seven times the cost per enrollee in the families and children categories. This helps explain why states have experienced greater increases in Medicaid costs for aged and disabled than for the combined category of families, children and pregnant women.¹⁶

Medicaid Enrollment Mix: Families & Children versus Aged & Disabled (44 States)

For forty-four states all or almost all Medicaid enrollees could be assigned either to the Aged and Disabled group or to the Families and Children and Pregnant Women group. ¹⁷ As previously noted, these forty-four states have 88.5% of the total December 2002 Medicaid enrollment in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Families and children and pregnant women represented 68.9% of total Medicaid enrollment in December 1997, based on data from these forty-four states. For these states that proportion increased to 73.0% as of December 2002, reflecting the more rapid rate of growth in enrollment among families and children. Among these states there was considerable variation in the proportion of Medicaid enrollees who were in the group of families, children and pregnant women, compared to the group of aged or disabled (Table 7). Among these forty-four states, the proportion represented by families and children increased in 39 states, decreasing only in Hawaii, Oregon, Utah, Virginia, and Washington.

Figure 9 also illustrates the variation among states, based on data for December 2002. While families and children and pregnant women comprised 73% of December 2002 Medicaid enrollees on average for these forty-four states, the range was from a high of about 81% in Alaska and New Mexico to a low of only 58.5% in Alabama. These differences may be attributable to differences in Medicaid eligibility policy among the states.








Appendix A: Additional Data

The Impact of SCHIP Medicaid Expansion on Medicaid Enrollment Trends

One factor contributing to the increases in Medicaid enrollment since 1998 has been the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). The U.S. Congress authorized SCHIP as part of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997. States began implementing their SCHIP programs in 1998. By December 2000, all 50 states and the District of Columbia had implemented their SCHIP programs.

From December 1998 to December 2002, Medicaid expansion SCHIP enrollment directly accounted for an increase of 513,424 Medicaid enrollees, or 5.7% of the total Medicaid growth of 8,936,073. This represents the direct contribution of SCHIP to the increase in Medicaid enrollment, and does not account for an indirect impact that also occurred as outreach for SCHIP identified low-income children that were eligible for Medicaid coverage.¹⁹



The Impact of Enrollees with Limited Coverage on Overall Enrollment

In general, Medicaid coverage is comprehensive, regardless of eligibility category. However, certain Medicaid eligibility categories provide coverage for only limited services. Although many of these categories were excluded from the enrollment data analyzed in the body of this report, enrollment in these categories has been increasing. The following analysis examines enrollment growth in several of these categories with limited coverage.

Family Planning Waivers

One limited coverage category is a family planning waiver in which women are enrolled in Medicaid only for services related to family planning. As of December 2002 there were fourteen states with approved family planning waivers. The structure and size of these programs varies significantly. Some only provide an extension of family planning services to women who lose

Medicaid eligibility but were eligible for Medicaid services during pregnancy and through 60 days postpartum. The most expansive programs extend family planning services to any individual that meets the state's income criteria. These and other policy differences result in wide variations in the size of these programs.

Family planning waiver enrollees are excluded from all of the Medicaid enrollee counts in this report. Ten of the fourteen states with waivers provided data on their family planning waiver enrollment.

The number of Medicaid family planning waivers has increased significantly in the last few years and enrollment in several of these waivers is very large. For example, as of December 2002, California's family planning waiver enrollment was more than 1.4 million. This equates to nearly 72% of the family planning waiver enrollment total from the ten states from which we received separate data.

California's family planning waiver enrollment growth over recent years has been the main reason for the increase in Section 1115 waiver adult enrollment over the same time period. Section 1115 of the Social Security Act allows states to use federal Medicaid or SCHIP dollars in ways that do not conform to existing federal standards and options. Under Section 1115, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has broad authority to approve research and demonstration projects that "further the objectives" of the program.

The other states with approved family planning waivers that had been implemented as of December 2002 were Delaware, New York, Oregon, and Rhode Island.²⁰

Pharmacy Plus Waivers

As of December 2002 Florida, Illinois, Maryland and Wisconsin had approved Pharmacy Plus waivers that allowed enrollment of senior citizens in Medicaid for only pharmacy services. The data in this report for these states excludes over 200,000 elderly individuals enrolled in Medicaid in these states only for a pharmacy benefit.

Medicare Cost-Sharing

Another group of enrollees with limited coverage is Medicare beneficiaries who are enrolled in Medicaid for payment of some or all of their Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. While only a limited number of states have the Family Planning Waivers mentioned above, the Medicare cost-sharing categories apply in all states. For this study, separate data were available for these Medicare cost-sharing categories for 28 states that represent 52 % of total U.S. Medicaid enrollment in December 2002.

While this group of enrollees has increased by 48% over the five year period from December 1997 to December 2002, in these 28 states that were able to provide separate data the Medicare cost-sharing groups account for only 2.4% of total December 2002 Medicaid enrollment. Therefore inclusion of these individuals in the Medicaid trends does not substantially alter the change in total Medicaid enrollment from December 1997 to December 2002 for these 28 states. Since it is only possible to separate the data for 28 states and since the impact of this group is minimal, these limited benefit enrollees are included in the Medicaid enrollment numbers in this report.

Appendix B: Children versus Adults Notes

Appendix C: Study Methodology and Data Issues

This study is based on data provided by each of the fifty states and the District of Columbia. Health Management Associates asked each state to provide the internal reports they use to track enrollment in the program. Each state's report included total enrollment, and enrollment in certain eligibility categories. The reports are not standardized across states. Where it was possible to do so, the state enrollment data were grouped to further examine trends in specific Medicaid eligibility categories.

The data tables and graphs in this document present "point-in-time" monthly Medicaid enrollment counts for the months of June and December of each year from 1997 through 2002. The data were provided to Health Management Associates by each state Medicaid program between May and August 2003.

To provide timely data and not overly burden state agency staff, states were asked to provide "off-the-shelf" reports on Medicaid enrollment. In other words, these are generally the same reports states use for their own purposes. Since each state uses different categories in internal enrollment reports it is not possible to track all of the detail for all fifty states and the District of Columbia. This report provides information on enrollment trends for categories of enrollees across as many states as possible, given the limitations of the source data.

States vary in how they count enrollment for a given month for their own purposes. Some states count the number of enrollees as of the first day of the month and never adjust the report. Some states count the number of enrollees as of the last day of the month and never adjust the report. Data for some states also include "retroactive" eligibles, i.e., individuals whose Medicaid eligibility is established at a later date, but whose coverage is retroactive to a prior point in time. When a person applies for Medicaid, federal processing standards allow the state up to 45 days to complete the eligibility determination process. In this process, for some Medicaid categories it is possible for a state to look at the period immediately prior to the date of application and determine whether eligibility criteria were met for a period of as many as 90 days prior to the date of application (and if eligible, to cover medical bills incurred in this period.)

States also vary in their treatment of "spend-down" enrollees. Some states include in their enrollment counts persons with excess income that qualify to "spend-down" to Medicaid eligibility whether or not they have incurred sufficient medical costs to become eligible for Medicaid in that month. Other states only include those individuals that have met their "spend-down" requirement. Since a primary goal of this report is to identify trends, these variations have been deemed acceptable, as long as a given state doesn't change its methodology over time.

The counts provided by the states reflect all persons with Medicaid eligibility for each month. Different eligibility categories have different levels of Medicaid coverage. Every person with Medicaid coverage was counted as an enrollee with the exception of family planning waiver enrollees and pharmacy plus waiver enrollees. No other adjustment was made for these persons who are enrolled in Medicaid categories with less than full coverage. The count of persons on Medicaid includes a small number of individuals that are only covered by Medicaid for emergency services and persons with Medicare and Medicaid dual eligibility who are enrolled as Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries (QMBs), Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries (SLMBs) or Qualified Individuals (QIs) for whom Medicaid only pays a portion of Medicare premiums, copayments and deductibles. (See Appendix A for a more detailed discussion of enrollees with limited benefits.)

Persons in state-only health coverage programs that are not funded by the federal Medicaid program are not included in the count of Medicaid enrollees.

While Health Management Associates asked the state Medicaid agencies for "off-the-shelf" reports used by the states to track Medicaid enrollment, some states chose to produce special reports for use in producing this report. In some of the states the single state agency for Medicaid does not determine Medicaid eligibility, and data were obtained from the eligibility agency.

Common Categorization of Enrollees

The initial expectation was that it would be possible to compare trends in most of the states for all of the categories used in the cross-state trends. As the data were received from the states we found that none of these categories existed in every state.

Level of Data Detail

A related issue is the great variety in the level of detail we received from the states. The number of distinct categories ranged from two to 166, with the exception of two states for which only totals were available. The states with the greatest numbers of categories provided us with algorithms used by the state to aggregate the data. HMA applied these algorithms to the detailed data to create more meaningful aggregations.

States with the fewest categories were generally the ones we could not readily compare with other states.

Point-in-Time Values

National reports issued by CMS also use data provided by state Medicaid agencies. CMS reports show the total number of persons "ever-enrolled" in Medicaid during a quarterly or annual period. The "ever-enrolled" measure of Medicaid enrollment used in CMS reports differs from the "point-in-time" measure of Medicaid enrollment used here. CMS reports show the unduplicated count of persons enrolled at any time and for any length of time during the indicated reporting period. For example, in annual CMS reports a person enrolled in Medicaid for one month of the year and a person enrolled for the entire year are each counted as one enrollee for that year. In contrast, the data reported in this report show enrollment in specific months. Given that each month individuals enroll and disenroll, the enrollment count in any specific month will always be less than the number ever-enrolled during a twelve month period. The extent to which the monthly number is less than the "ever-enrolled" number depends on the extent of monthly enrollment, disenrollment and re-enrollment activity.

The point-in-time count of enrollees allows analysis of shorter-term trends in enrollment data. By definition, the point-in-time monthly count of enrollees will be less than the unduplicated annual number of enrollees.

Data Completeness

As a result of the processing time and possibility of retroactive eligibility, counts of Medicaid enrollment for a specific month may change over the following several months. The data in this study are based on state reports usually produced two to five months following the indicated month. Effort was made to use reports that reflect retroactive eligibility where they exist, and for each period to use reports that reflect the same adjustments. Nevertheless, it is possible that additional changes may have occurred subsequent to the counts provided for our use in this study.
