

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# **Executive Summary**

For the past four years, the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured has tracked national and state Medicaid enrollment trends using monthly enrollment data provided by each state and the District of Columbia. These monthly data provide a timely and reliable basis for following Medicaid enrollment trends nationally and across each of the states.<sup>1</sup> This report provides Medicaid enrollment data as of June 2003 for all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

## Key Findings

In the month of June 2003, a total of 40.6 million persons were enrolled in Medicaid (excluding those with only partial benefits, such as under family planning waivers). This represented an annual increase of 2.8 million individuals or 5.9 percent from June 2002. This 5.9 percent rate of Medicaid enrollment growth, while still relatively high, marks a decline from previous June-to-June periods, as enrollment grew by 8.3 percent between June 2000 and June 2001 and 9.8 percent between June 2001 and June 2002.

Medicaid enrollment nationally has increased continuously since June 1998. Growth was relatively modest in state fiscal years 1999 and 2000, when enrollment increased by 2.0 percent and 3.7 percent, respectively.<sup>3</sup> Then, as the economic downturn began, rates of growth peaked in state fiscal years 2001 and 2002, when enrollment increased at annual rates of 8.3 percent and 9.8 percent, respectively. Over state fiscal year 2003 Medicaid enrollment growth slowed to 5.9 percent. This growth reflected the continuing effects of the economic downturn, which contributed to the relatively high rate of growth. At the same time, many states instituted policies in 2002 and 2003 specifically designed to slow enrollment growth. These policies included budget-driven reductions in eligibility levels and the reversal of previous efforts to simplify and streamline eligibility processes.

Not included in the body of this report are over one million Medicaid enrollees in U.S. Territories. Also not included are persons with single-benefit Medicaid coverage only. In the category of single-benefit coverage in June 2003 are 2.9 million individuals enrolled in waiver programs that provide family planning coverage only, and over 300,000 seniors enrolled in Pharmacy Plus waiver programs that provide Medicaid pharmacy coverage only. Another category of partial Medicaid coverage includes Medicare – Medicaid dual eligibles that qualify only for limited Medicaid coverage for some or all of their Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. It was not possible to separately account completely for these beneficiaries in all states. Thus, these beneficiaries are included in the national totals reported in the text and are estimated to account for approximately 0.2 percent of all beneficiaries. Note: If all Medicaid beneficiaries were counted, including those enrolled in single-benefit waiver programs, enrollment in June 2002 would total 41.1 million, and enrollment in June 2003 would total 43.8 million.

The rate of enrollment growth slowed in each of the three most recent six-month periods. The growth rate was just 2.3 percent from December 2002 to June 2003. This was down from the 3.5 percent rate of growth from June 2002 to December 2002, and was the lowest six-month rate of growth since the December 1999 to June 2000 period.

The national trends mask considerable variation across states. Over the year from June 2002 to June 2003, U.S. enrollment grew 5.9 percent, but in individual states, annual rates of growth were 10 percent or greater (up to 22 percent) in eight states. In 19 states, growth was between 5 percent and 9.9 percent; in 17 states and the District of Columbia growth was positive but less than 5 percent; and enrollment declined (by as much as 9.2 percent) in six states.

Rates of growth also vary by category of enrollment. Based on 44 states reporting data for these categories, enrollment among families, children and pregnant women increased by 8.1 percent from June 2002 to June 2003. This was less than the 13.1 percent growth that occurred in the year ending in June 2002, but was the same as the 8.1 percent average annual rate of growth for the two previous years, ending in June 2001.

Enrollment in the aged, blind and disabled categories has increased in each period covered by this report. In the period from June 2002 to June 2003, enrollment increased by 3.7 percent, slightly less than the 4.0 percent growth recorded for the previous annual period from June 2001 to June 2002, but above the 2.5 percent annual rate of growth for the two years ending in June 2001 (based on data from 44 states).

#### Total Medicaid Enrollment in the 50 States and D.C.

This report is based on data provided by all fifty states and the District of Columbia on the total number of individuals enrolled in their Medicaid programs for each June and December from June 1997 to June 2003. The June 2003 total enrollment counts in this report exclude about 2.9 million individuals enrolled in Medicaid through Family Planning waivers that only receive family planning services and about 300,000 elderly individuals enrolled in Medicaid through Pharmacy Plus waivers. Additional information about these waivers is included in Appendix A. As shown in Figure 1, total Medicaid enrollment in June 2003 was 40.6 million.



June 2003 was the last month of fiscal year 2002-2003 for most states. During FY 2003 most States dealt with significant budget issues related to declining revenues and increasing costs. Medicaid enrollment growth contributed to these cost increases. On average, Medicaid spending increased by 9.3% in FY 2003 while total state general fund spending for all government programs increased by only 0.6%.<sup>4</sup>

In the aggregate, for the 50 states and the District of Columbia, Medicaid enrollment increased by 5.9% from June 2002 to June 2003. This rate of increase is considerably smaller than the 8.3% increase from June 2000 to June 2001 and the 9.8% increase from June 2001 to June 2002, as shown in Figure 2.

As shown in Figure 3 on the next page, the six-month rate of increase in Medicaid enrollment was lower in the period from December 2002 to June 2003 than in any six-month period since the interval from December 1999 to June 2000.

States have indicated that economic recovery was not the driving force behind this slowing of Medicaid enrollment growth in early 2003. As state revenues declined and Medicaid costs continued to rise, almost all states took actions to slow Medicaid spending growth. In many states, these included actions specifically designed to limit or reduce Medicaid enrollment.

During fiscal year 2003, twenty-five states reduced or cut eligibility, including imposition of new or increased premiums for expansion populations.<sup>5</sup> Nine of these states reversed previous simplifications in the application and renewal process making it more difficult for enrollees to qualify for the Medicaid program. States also sought to limit caseload growth for long-term care and home and community based services by applying more aggressive criteria to nursing home admissions and by limiting the number of individuals that could be enrolled in waiver programs.

The majority of the 25 states that adopted eligibility restrictions in FY 2003 made only modest changes to their programs. For example, some states reduced the length of time persons were covered by implementing policy changes such as reducing continuous eligibility or reducing the length of time during which people could receive transitional Medicaid. Two states, Oregon and Oklahoma, eliminated their medically needy programs, which affected about 9,000 individuals.

Six states, however, (Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, and Tennessee) made broad eligibility cuts that, taken together, were intended to remove 400,000 enrollees (mostly adults) from the Medicaid program. Each of the six states faced delays or rollbacks of previously adopted eligibility cuts. Courts temporarily restored coverage for enrollees who lost coverage in Connecticut, Missouri and

Nebraska. The eligibility cut in Michigan was permanently blocked by court order. In Massachusetts, the eligibility cut was implemented but the number of enrollees impacted was less than anticipated.<sup>6</sup>

Under new guidelines, Tennessee embarked on a massive "redetermination process' to review the eligibility of TennCare enrollees. As a result TennCare enrollment was reduced by more than 200,000. These were individuals that no longer qualified for TennCare or that failed to contact TennCare during the redetermination period. While a lawsuit was filed, the courts did not require the state to reverse its action. During the litigation period, in early 2003, the state offered a "grace period" during which 150,000 individuals that had failed to contact TennCare during the redetermination period could reapply for TennCare.

While eligibility in each state was eventually restored for most of the targeted group, the restorations occurred between March and September of 2003. Therefore, many of the cuts affected June 2003 Medicaid enrollment, and the restorations are not reflected in these data.

# Variations in Medicaid Enrollment by State

While total Medicaid enrollment increased by 2.3% from December 2002 to June 2003, there was significant variation among the states (Tables 1a and 1b and Figure 4). Six states had enrollment decreases (ranging from –1.3% to –9.7%) and forty-three states had enrollment increases. Two states saw virtually no change in enrollment.

#### States with Enrollment Declines

Three of the states in which enrollment decreased, Massachusetts, Oregon, and Tennessee have Medicaid 1115 waivers that allow them to extend Medicaid coverage to low-income individuals that are not part of the federally established Medicaid "categories". These three states all took action during their 2003 fiscal years to limit the number of enrollees in these Medicaid expansion categories.

The Medicaid eligibility cutbacks in Massachusetts, Oregon, and Tennessee primarily impacted "childless adults" – non-disabled, non-elderly individuals that are not parents of minor children and therefore do not qualify for any of the mandatory or optional Medicaid eligibility categories. State Medicaid programs can only cover childless adults with a federal waiver under section 1115 of the Social Security Act. These three states (and Delaware) have had this type of waiver for many years. However, each of these three states was compelled to suspend or reduce coverage to this population in response to budgetary pressures.

During FY 2003 Massachusetts eliminated the component of the MassHealth program that covered the "long-term unemployed", a "childless adult" group. As a result, enrollment in this category dropped from nearly 59,000 individuals in December 2002 to fewer than 17,000 in June 2003.

Total TennCare enrollment declined by nearly ten percent from December 2002 to June 2003. Tennessee closed enrollment in TennCare for uninsured and uninsurable individuals and took administrative action that reduced the enrollment in this group from 508,488 in December 2002 to 259,644 individuals in June 2003, a decrease of nearly 50%. However, when this action occurred, Tennessee identified that a significant number of the "uninsured" TennCare enrollees actually met the traditional Medicaid criteria. As a result Tennessee actually experienced a 24% growth from December 2002 to June 2003 in the number of TennCare enrollees that were traditional Medicaid enrollees (from 936,061 to 1,045,150 individuals). The net result was an enrollment reduction of about 140,000 individuals.

There were several changes to the Oregon Health Plan that were implemented in February 2003. Oregon eliminated its small Medically Needy program at that time. In addition, the expansion population (parents with incomes less than 100% of poverty and single adults or childless couples with incomes less than 100% of poverty) was changed to a new benefit package with new premium and cost sharing requirements. These changes, according to the June 2003 enrollment data, resulted in a significant decline in enrollment of single adults and childless couples.<sup>8</sup>



The other three states with significant decreases in Medicaid enrollment were Nebraska, South Carolina, and Connecticut.

Medicaid enrollment in Nebraska declined by 9.2% from June 2002 to June 2003, with most of that decline (7%) occurring between December 2002 and June 2003. Nebraska made several changes that either reduced coverage for families or tightened the eligibility process. Among the changes made was a reduction in the length of continuous eligibility for children, a reduction in the number of months of coverage under Transitional Medical Assistance, a reduction in the amount of earnings disregard, and a change in the treatment of household composition for eligibility determination. As a result, enrollment of low-income children and parents declined by 10% (from 155,000 to 139,000) from December 2002 to June 2003.

South Carolina tightened some of their eligibility processes for families and children in FY 2003. Among the South Carolina changes was "elimination of passive review" of eligibility for Medicaid and SCHIP children, which resulted in a small decrease in Medicaid enrollment of low-income children (from 283,000 to under 270,000) from December 2002 to June 2003.

Connecticut had a 3.8% decrease in Medicaid enrollment in the first six months of 2003. Continuous eligibility for children was dropped and the state increased the frequency of redeterminations for current Medicaid enrollees. During FY 2003 Connecticut also adopted a change in eligibility policy that dropped the income threshold for HUSKY A Adults from 150% to 100% of the federal poverty level, which affected about 19,000 adults. However, the state was enjoined from implementing this policy by court order and most of the affected adults were reinstated.<sup>9</sup>

### States with the Largest Enrollment Increases

Utah, Oklahoma, Arizona, Georgia, and Texas all experienced enrollment growth of more than 6% in the first six months of 2003.

The most significant factor driving Utah's enrollment growth was implementation of an 1115 waiver that extended a very limited benefit package (excluding inpatient hospital coverage and specialty care) to parents and adults without children in FY 2003. Utah Medicaid enrollment increased by 21.8% from June 2002 to June 2003, including a 9% increase from December 2002 to June 2003. Excluding the 17,000 individuals enrolled in this limited benefit package, Utah Medicaid enrollment grew by 10.7% between the June 2002 and June 2003, and by 4.8% between December 2002 and June 2003. Utah also took steps to simplify the Medicaid eligibility process and reduced verification requirements during the same period.

Oklahoma experienced an enrollment decline from June 2002 to December 2002, which was followed by an increase of 7.7% from December 2002 to June 2003. Oklahoma eliminated its small Medically Needy program, but aged and disabled Medicaid

enrollment increased by 6.4% and enrollment of families and children increased by 8.4% from December 2002 to June 2003.

Arizona had enrollment growth of more than 20% between June 2002 and June 2003, continuing a trend that began in 1999. Arizona Medicaid enrollment in June 2003 is more than double June 1999 enrollment. Because of Arizona's eligibility policies, the growth over the last four years has occurred in both "Low-Income Family" enrollment (an increase of 284%) and "Other Families With Children" enrollment (150%). In the period from December 2002 to June 2003 most of the enrollment growth was in the "Other Families With Children" category, an increase of 38% in just six months.

Georgia has experienced Medicaid enrollment growth in excess of 9% for three years in a row without any expansion of Medicaid eligibility. Georgia Medicaid officials indicate that the recession hit harder in Georgia than nationally and that Georgia is taking longer to pull out of the recession. The number of new unemployment claims in Georgia didn't flatten out until early 2004. In particular, Georgia shows continued growth in the number of low-income children enrolled in Medicaid.

While Texas Medicaid officials indicate that there were no changes in eligibility standards or the enrollment process during state fiscal year 2003, Texas experienced significant increases in Medicaid enrollment. After having increased by 18.6% from June 2001 to June 2002, total Medicaid enrollment in Texas increased by 16.8% from June 2002 to June 2003. These Medicaid enrollment increases occurred in almost every category. 12

# Medicaid Enrollment Trends by Category

This report tracks trends in total enrollment and also in five selected Medicaid eligibility groups, based on data provided by the states. States were asked to provide data for this report that showed the distribution of enrollees by the category of eligibility, and whenever possible they did so. However, the categories used for enrollment reports differed from state to state, and some states provided only a summary number for total enrollment.

All states and DC provided data on total enrollment, but data were not provided by all states for all eligibility categories. The number of states for which data were available varied by eligibility group, ranging from 15 to 44. Data for these groups are useful to suggest enrollment trends and provide important information reflecting specific states. It is important to emphasize that data for these groups from reporting states do not necessarily reflect the experience of all states.

The groups of enrollees and the number of states for which data were available are:

- Children versus Adults (31 states)
- Families, Children and Pregnant Women (44 states)
- Transitional Medical Assistance (15 states)
- Poverty-Related Medicaid Enrollees (22 states)
- Aged and Disabled (44 states)

# Children Versus Adults (31 States)

One of the important trends in recent years has been the increasing numbers of children with Medicaid coverage. Recent changes in Medicaid eligibility policy and processes have directly and indirectly impacted the number of children enrolled in Medicaid. Some families and children lost eligibility for Medicaid during implementation of welfare reform in 1997 and 1998. In many states the processes initially used to close welfare cases resulted in simultaneous loss of Medicaid enrollment, without any assessment of whether any or all family members still qualified for Medicaid under a different category. Later states modified these processes. In addition, as states implemented their SCHIP programs and launched extensive outreach campaigns during the late 1990s, many more Medicaid eligible children were identified and enrolled in eligibility categories specifically designed to cover children in low-income families.

For this report states were asked to provide data on enrollment of children versus adults if such information was available from existing reports. Thirty-one states provided data for both June 1997 and June 2003 (Table 2). These thirty-one states represent 72% of total US Medicaid enrollment as of June 2003. (See notes for this table in Appendix B.)

For these thirty-one states, children represented a slightly greater share of Medicaid enrollees in June 2003 than they did six years earlier in June 1997, an increase from 53.2% to 55.1% of total enrollment. Several states increased their income thresholds for parent coverage, either by "disregarding" more income (the 1931b option), or through an 1115 waiver. Some state officials indicate that these policy changes result not only in an increase in the number of parents enrolled in Medicaid, but also in an increase in the number of children enrolled. Parents may be more likely to enroll their children in Medicaid if they themselves can also receive health care services from the program.

# Families, Children and Pregnant Women (44 States)

Forty-four states provided data on the number of children, parents, and pregnant women enrolled in Medicaid. Enrollment in this category increased by more than 900,000 from December 2002 to June 2003. However, this was the smallest increase since December 2000.



# Transitional Medical Assistance (15 States)

This Medicaid category was created as part of national welfare reform to extend Medicaid eligibility for uninsured families that no longer qualify to receive Medicaid due to increased income. Fifteen states provided data on trends in this enrollment group.

As shown in Figure 6 and Table 4, enrollment in this category fluctuates. Several factors cause variations in this category from time to time. One variable is the number of

families leaving Medicaid due to increased earnings. In the early days of welfare reform, welfare caseloads were larger and there were many more families leaving Medicaid and welfare due to increased earnings.

Another cause of fluctuation in the number of Transitional Medical Assistance (TMA) enrollees is the changes states have made in their processes to inform families with increased income of the availability of TMA. As mentioned earlier, some states that provided more than the required minimum number of TMA coverage months have recently reduced the TMA coverage period. Among these fifteen states that reported separate TMA enrollment, Kansas added a requirement that enrollees reapply for TMA at six months instead of twelve months.

### Poverty-Related Medicaid Enrollment (22 States)


This category is a subset of the larger "families, children and pregnant women" category. Poverty-related Medicaid enrollment includes low-income children and low-income pregnant women. Income levels are higher for children and pregnant women than they are for other family members, and assets are generally not considered. While there are federal minimum income thresholds for these groups, many states have chosen to cover persons with income levels higher than the minimum thresholds in order to cover more children and pregnant women.

In the period from June 1997 to June 2003 the major expansion of income eligibility in this group involved the implementation of Medicaid-expansion SCHIP programs. Those enrollees are included in this category by states that include the Medicaid expansion SCHIP enrollees in their Medicaid enrollment data.

While there were few changes in income levels for the poverty-related group, enrollment for this group grew as a result of simplified Medicaid eligibility processes in many states. These simplification efforts included shortened application forms, reduced verification requirements and elimination of face-to-face interview requirements. In addition, most states report that when they conducted outreach programs to find children eligible for SCHIP, they found many children that were eligible for Medicaid under a poverty-related category. Many states have indicated that for every SCHIP child found through outreach they found two Medicaid-eligible children. Some states found even higher proportions of Medicaid-eligible children.

Twenty-two states continue to provide data on enrollment in this category. As shown in Figure 7 and Table 5 the growth in the number of enrollees in this eligibility group has been steady over the six-year period covered by this report. If data from these twenty-two states is indicative of trends for all states, enrollment in this group has increased at a faster rate than enrollment in the larger group of families, children and pregnant women.

# Aged and Disabled (44 States)

This category includes aged, blind and disabled individuals who receive cash assistance from the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, those with higher incomes that only receive Medicaid (including many nursing home residents and individuals enrolled in home and community services waivers), and low-income Medicare beneficiaries who receive varying levels of assistance with their Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. <sup>14</sup>

As can be seen in Figure 8 and Table 6, aged and disabled Medicaid enrollment has increased in every six-month interval covered by this study. The number and percentage increases have been smaller than those that occurred in the families, children and pregnant women group. However, the increases are significant due to the much higher cost for medical services for persons who are elderly or disabled. These enrollees accounted for more than two-thirds of all Medicaid spending in 2003.



<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>14</sup> Virtually all of the elderly and approximately one-third of the disabled Medicaid enrollees also receive assistance from the Medicare program. Some of these "dual-eligibles" have full Medicaid coverage that supplements their Medicare benefits. Others only receive Medicaid support for their Medicare premiums, deductibles and co-insurance. For the twenty-seven states with separate data, these "Medicare cost-sharing" enrollees represented about 8.7% of total aged blind and disabled enrollment in June 2003. In June 1997 these individuals represented 6.5% of total aged and disabled Medicaid enrollment. For most states these enrollees are included in the data in this report.

Connecticut data exclude QMB-only enrollees. After December 2000, Maine's QMBs are not included in totals. June 2003 data for Georgia adds about 39,000 Specified Low-Income Beneficiaries (SLMBs) and Qualified Individuals (QIs) for the first time.




## Appendix A: Additional Data

# The Direct Impact of SCHIP Medicaid Expansion on Medicaid Enrollment Trends

One factor contributing to the increases in Medicaid enrollment since 1998 has been the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). The U.S. Congress authorized SCHIP as part of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997. States began implementing SCHIP programs in 1998. By July 2000, all 50 states and the District of Columbia had implemented SCHIP programs. States had the option of implementing SCHIP as an expansion of their Medicaid program, as a separate program or as a combination of both.

As shown in Appendix Figure A-1, most children enrolled in the SCHIP program are enrolled in programs that are separate from State Medicaid programs. Most of the Medicaid enrollment data in this report includes Medicaid Expansion SCHIP enrollees.

## The Impact of Enrollees with Limited Coverage on Overall Enrollment

In general, Medicaid coverage is comprehensive, regardless of eligibility category. However, certain Medicaid eligibility categories provide coverage for only limited services. Enrollment in these categories has been increasing. Only some of these enrollees are included in total Medicaid enrollment numbers.

## **Family Planning Waivers**

One limited coverage category is a family planning waiver in which women are enrolled in Medicaid only for services related to family planning. The number of Medicaid family planning waivers has increased significantly in the last few years and enrollment in several of these waivers is very large. For example, as of June 2003, California's family planning waiver enrollment was nearly 1.5 million. This equates to about 71% of total family planning waiver enrollment in the eleven states from which we received separate data.

As of June 2003 there were sixteen states that had implemented family planning waivers. The structure and size of these programs varies significantly. Some only provide an extension of family planning services to women who lose Medicaid eligibility after being eligible for Medicaid services during pregnancy and through 60 days postpartum. The most expansive programs extend family planning services to any individual that meets the state's income criteria. These and other policy differences result in wide variations in the size of these programs.

Family planning waiver enrollees are excluded from all of the Medicaid enrollee counts in this report. Eleven of the sixteen states with waivers provided data on their family planning waiver enrollment.

The other states with approved family planning waivers that had been implemented as of June 2003 were Delaware, New York, Oregon, Rhode Island, and Virginia.<sup>15</sup>

## **Pharmacy Plus Waivers**

As of June 2003, approved Pharmacy Plus waivers in Florida, Illinois, South Carolina and Wisconsin allowed enrollment of senior citizens in Medicaid for pharmacy services alone. The data in this report for these states excludes more than 300,000 Pharmacy Plus individuals. Maryland and Vermont also have 1115 waivers that offer a pharmacy-only benefit to seniors.

Vermont indicates that about 16,000 enrollees were in this program in June 2003. Also, Tennessee has a small "grandfathered" population of Medicare beneficiaries that receives only an Rx benefit. These enrollees are also not included in Medicaid enrollment data.

## **Medicare Cost-Sharing**

Another group of enrollees with limited coverage is Medicare beneficiaries who are enrolled in Medicaid for payment of some or all of their Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. While only a limited number of states have Family Planning and pharmacy waivers mentioned above, the Medicare cost-sharing categories apply in all states. For this study, separate data were available for these Medicare cost-sharing categories for only twenty-eight states, which represent 52 % of total U.S. Medicaid enrollment in June 2003.

In these twenty-eight states, this group of enrollees has increased by 68% over the six-year period from June 1997 to June 2003. However these enrollees represent only 2.6% of total June 2003 Medicaid enrollment for these states. Therefore inclusion of these individuals in the Medicaid trends does not substantially alter the <u>change</u> in total Medicaid enrollment from June 1997 to June 2003 nationally or for these twenty-eight states. Since it is only possible to separate the data for twenty-eight states and since the impact of this group is minimal, these limited benefit enrollees are included in the Medicaid enrollment numbers in this report.

## **Appendix C: Study Methodology and Data Issues**

This study is based on data provided by each of the fifty states and the District of Columbia. Health Management Associates asked each state to provide the internal reports they use to track enrollment in the program. Each state's report included total enrollment, and enrollment in certain eligibility categories. Report categories are not standardized across states. Where it was possible to do so, the state enrollment data were grouped to further examine trends in specific Medicaid eligibility categories.

The data tables and graphs in this document present "point-in-time" monthly Medicaid enrollment counts for the months of June and December of each year from 1997 through 2002. The data were provided to Health Management Associates by each state Medicaid program between May and August 2003.

To provide timely data and not overly burden state agency staff, states were asked to provide "off-the-shelf" reports on Medicaid enrollment. In other words, these are generally the same reports states use for their own purposes. Since each state uses different categories in internal enrollment reports it is not possible to track enrollment detail for all fifty states and the District of Columbia. This report provides information on enrollment trends for categories of enrollees across as many states as possible, given the limitations of the source data.

States vary in how they count enrollment for a given month for their own purposes. Some states count the number of enrollees as of the first day of the month and never adjust the report. Some states count the number of enrollees as of the last day of the month and never adjust the report. Data for some states also include "retroactive" eligibles, i.e., individuals whose Medicaid eligibility is established at a later date, but whose coverage is retroactive to a prior point in time. When a person applies for Medicaid, federal processing standards allow the state up to 45 days to complete the eligibility determination process. In this process, for some Medicaid categories it is possible for a state to look at the period immediately prior to the date of application and determine whether eligibility criteria were met for a period of as many as 90 days prior to the date of application (and if eligible, to cover medical bills incurred in this period.)

States also vary in their treatment of "spend-down" enrollees. Some states include in their enrollment counts persons with excess income that qualify to "spend-down" to Medicaid eligibility whether or not they have incurred sufficient medical costs to become eligible for Medicaid in that month. Other states only include those individuals that have met their "spend-down" requirement. Since a primary goal of this report is to identify trends, these variations have been deemed acceptable, as long as a given state does not change its methodology over time.

The counts provided by the states reflect all persons with Medicaid eligibility for each month. Different eligibility categories have different levels of Medicaid coverage. Every person with Medicaid coverage was counted as an enrollee with the exception of family planning waiver enrollees and pharmacy plus waiver enrollees. No other adjustment was made for these persons who are enrolled in Medicaid categories with less than full coverage. The count of persons on Medicaid includes a small number of individuals that are only covered by Medicaid for emergency services and persons with Medicare and Medicaid dual eligibility who are enrolled as Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries (QMBs), Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries (SLMBs) or Qualified Individuals (QIs) for whom Medicaid only pays a portion of Medicare premiums, copayments and deductibles. (See Appendix A for a more detailed discussion of enrollees with limited benefits).

To the extent possible, persons in state-only health coverage programs that are not funded by the federal Medicaid program are excluded in the count of Medicaid enrollees.

While Health Management Associates asked the state Medicaid agencies for "off-the-shelf" reports used by the states to track Medicaid enrollment, some states chose to produce special reports for use in this report. In some of the states the single state agency for Medicaid does not determine Medicaid eligibility, and data were obtained from the eligibility agency.

## **Common Categorization of Enrollees**

The initial expectation was that it would be possible to compare trends in most of the states for all of the categories used in the cross-state trends. As the data were received from the states, we found that none of these categories existed in every state.

#### Level of Data Detail

A related issue is the great variety in the level of detail we received from the states. The number of distinct categories ranged from two to 166, with the exception of two states for which only totals were available. The states with the greatest numbers of categories provided us with algorithms used by the state to aggregate the data. HMA applied these algorithms to the detailed data to create aggregations that are more meaningful.

States with the fewest categories were generally the ones we could not readily compare with other states.

#### **Point-in-Time Values**

National reports issued by CMS also use data provided by state Medicaid agencies. CMS reports show the total number of persons "ever-enrolled" in Medicaid during a quarterly or annual period. The "ever-enrolled" measure of Medicaid enrollment used in CMS reports differs from the "point-in-time" measure of Medicaid enrollment used here. CMS reports show the unduplicated count of persons enrolled at any time and for any length of time during the indicated reporting period. For example, in annual CMS reports, a person enrolled in Medicaid for one month of the year and a person enrolled for the entire year are each counted as one enrollee for that year. In contrast, the data reported in this report show enrollment in specific months. Given that each month individuals enroll and disenroll, the enrollment count in any specific month will always be less than the number ever-enrolled during a twelve month period. The extent to which the monthly number is less than the "ever-enrolled" number depends on the extent of monthly enrollment, disenrollment and re-enrollment activity.

The point-in-time count of enrollees allows analysis of shorter-term trends in enrollment data. By definition, the point-in-time monthly count of enrollees will be less than the unduplicated annual number of enrollees.

## **Data Completeness**

As a result of the processing time and possibility of retroactive eligibility, counts of Medicaid enrollment for a specific month may change over the following several months. The data in this study are based on state reports usually produced two to five months following the indicated month. Effort was made to use reports that reflect retroactive eligibility where they exist, and for each period to use reports that reflect the same adjustments. Nevertheless, it is possible that additional changes may have occurred subsequent to the counts provided for our use in this study.
