## Methodology

The Kaiser Family Foundation and *seventeen* magazine National Survey of Teens: Relationships is a random-sample survey of 505 teens, ages 15-17. The survey was designed by the Foundation and *seventeen* and conducted by telephone by International Communications Research (ICR) between July 11-17, 2002 as part of their monthly teen Omnibus survey. The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 5% for the total sample and may be larger for certain subsets presented in this analysis.
