A BILL

To reauthorize the Combating Autism Act of 2006 (Public Law 109–416).

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Combating Autism Re-

5 authorization Act".

6 SEC. 2. CONTINUATION OF PROGRAMS RELATING TO AU-

7 **TISM.**

8 Part R of title III of the Public Health Service Act

9 (42 U.S.C. 280i et seq.) is amended—

(a) in section 399AA(e), by striking "2011" and in serting "2014";

3 (b) in section 399BB(g), by striking "2011" and in4 serting "2014";

5 (c) in section 399CC(f), by striking "2011" and in6 serting "2014"; and

7 (d) by inserting after section 399DD the following:
8 "SEC. 399DD-1. REPORT TO CONGRESS ON REAUTHORIZA9 TION.

10 "(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 2 years after the date of enactment of the Combating Autism Reauthoriza-11 12 tion Act, the Secretary, in coordination with the Secretary 13 of Education, shall prepare and submit to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of the Senate 14 15 and the Committee on Energy and Commerce of the House of Representatives a progress report on activities 16 related to autism spectrum disorder and other develop-17 mental disabilities. 18

19 "(b) CONTENTS.—The report submitted under sub-20 section (a) shall include—

21 "(1) a description of the progress made in im22 plementing the provisions of the Combating Autism
23 Act of 2006;

"(2) a description of the amounts expended on
 the implementation of each particular provision of
 the Combating Autism Act of 2006;

4 "(3) information on the incidence of autism
5 spectrum disorder and trend data of such incidence
6 since the date of enactment of the Combating Au7 tism Act of 2006;

8 "(4) information on the average age of diag-9 nosis for individuals with autism spectrum disorder 10 and other disabilities, including how that age may 11 have changed during the 6-year period beginning on 12 the date of enactment of the Combating Autism Act 13 of 2006;

"(5) information on the average age for intervention for individuals diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder and other developmental disabilities,
including how that age may have changed during the
6-year period beginning on the date of enactment of
the Combating Autism Act of 2006;

20 "(6) information on the average time between 21 initial screening for autism spectrum disorder and 22 diagnosis of, or the ruling out of, autism spectrum 23 disorder or other developmental disabilities, and in-24 formation on the average time between diagnosis 25 and evidence-based intervention for individuals with

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autism spectrum disorder or other developmental
 disabilities;

3 "(7) information on the effectiveness and out4 comes of interventions for individuals diagnosed with
5 autism spectrum disorder, including information
6 with respect to various subtypes of autism spectrum
7 disorder and other developmental disabilities and
8 how the age of the individual so diagnosed may af9 fect such effectiveness;

"(8) information on the effectiveness and outcomes of innovative and newly developed intervention
strategies for individuals with autism spectrum disorder or other developmental disabilities; and

"(9) information on services and supports provided to individuals with autism spectrum disorder
and other developmental disabilities who have
reached the age of majority (as described in section
615(m) of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. 1415(m)).".

20 SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

21 Section 399EE of the Public Health Service Act (42
22 U.S.C. 280i-4) is amended—

(a) in subsection (a) (relating to developmental disabilities surveillance and research program), by adding at
the end the following:

"(6) For each of fiscal years 2012, 2013, and 1 2 2014, \$22,000,000."; 3 (b) in subsection (b) (relating to autism education, early detection, and intervention), by adding at the end 4 the following: 5 "(6) For each of fiscal years 2012, 2013, and 6 2014, \$48,000,000."; and 7 8 (c) in subsection (c) (relating to interagency autism coordinating committee; certain other programs), by add-9 ing at the end the following: 10 "(6) For each of fiscal years 2012, 2013, and 11 2014, \$161,000,000.". 12

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
