McClatchy-Marist Poll National Survey November 23, 2010

How the Survey was Conducted

Nature of the Sample: National Poll of 1,020 Adults

This survey of 1,020 adults was conducted on November 15^{th} through November 18^{th} , 2010. Adults 18 years of age and older residing in the continental United States were interviewed by telephone. Telephone numbers were selected based upon a list of telephone exchanges from throughout the nation. The exchanges were selected to ensure that each region was represented in proportion to its population. To increase coverage, this land-line sample was supplemented by respondents reached through random dialing of cell phone numbers. The two samples were then combined. Results are statistically significant within ± 3.0 percentage points. There are 810 registered voters. The results for this subset are statistically significant within ± 3.5 percentage points. There are 371 Democrats and Democratic leaning independents and 337 Republicans and Republican leaning independents. The results for these subsets are statistically significant within ± 5.0 and ± 5.5 percentage points, respectively. The error margin increases for cross-tabulations.
