
## Figure 1: Adults Report Problems with Health Coverage During Previous Year


% of insured and uninsured reporting health coverage problem in previous year


Figure 2: Uninsured Adults Are More Likely to Have Problems Getting and Paying for Medical Care


Figure 3: Many of the Uninsured Who Had Problems Paying Medical Bills Still Owed Money

## Figure 4: Uninsured Adults in Fair and Poor Health Are Most Likely to Have Problems Getting Needed Medical Care


% reporting problems getting care by health status

Figure 6: Most Uninsured Don't Have Insurance Because They Can't Afford It


% of uninsured reporting "main reason" they don't have insurance


Figure 7: Why Do the Insured Have Problems Paying Medical Bills?
