# 1998 Kaiser Family Foundation Survey Of Americans' Knowledge On Teen Sexual Activity and Pregnancy

## Teen pregnancy rate

1. Among those teens who are sexually active, which of the following do you think best describes their pregnancy rate?

69%	It has INCREASED over the last 20 years
10%	It has DECREASED over the last 20 years
15%	It has stayed about the SAME over the last 20

• The teen pregnancy rate among sexually active teens has declined 15% in the last two decades, from 247 per 1,000 sexually active teens in 1974 to 210 in 1994.

### Unintended teen pregnancy

- 2. Thinking about the number of unintended pregnancies in the U.S. today, how many do you think occur among teenagers. Would you say that about 1 out of every 10 unintended pregnancies occurs among teenagers, about 2 out of 10, about 5 out of 10, or would you say about 8 out of every 10 unintended pregnancies occurs among teenagers?
  - 7% 1 in 10 21% 2 in 10 42% 5 in 10 16% 8 in 10 13% Don' know 1% Refused

 Nearly 610,000 of the 2.65 million unintended pregnancies (about 2 in 10) that occur each year to U.S. women (excluding miscarriages) are to teenagers.<sup>2</sup>

Age of teen girls' sexual partners

3. When teenage girls start having sexual intercourse, do you think that their sexual partners are typically: about their age -- that is within a year or two, about 3 to 4 years older, OR five or more years older than the teenage girls themselves?

49% About their age -- that is with in a year or two,

34% About 3 to 4 years older, OR

9% 5 or more years older?

7% Don't know

• More than half of teen girls' first sexual partners are no more than two years older than themselves (18% same age or younger, 43% 1-2 years older). A quarter of teen girls' first sexual partners are three to four years older (27%) and the remaining 12 percent of girls have partners who are five or more years older.<sup>3</sup>

#### Teen contraceptive use

4. When teens today have sex, how many do you think use contraceptives such as birth control pills or condoms? Do you think:

 93% of sexually active teen girls 15-19 years old report using some contraceptive method.<sup>4</sup> However, teens do not always use contraceptives consistently or correctly.<sup>5</sup>

#### Methodology:

The Kaiser Family Foundation's 1998 Survey of Americans' Knowledge On Teen Pregnancy And Sexual Activity was a national, random-sample, telephone survey of 1,018 adults aged 18 years or older. It was designed by staff from the Kaiser Family Foundation and Princeton Survey Research Associates (PSRA) and conducted by PSRA between February 25 and March 1, 1998. The margin of error is plus or minus 3 percentage points.
