

Share of Black women who say it is a bad time to be a Black woman in America



Percent who say there was a time in the last 12 months where they felt they were treated unfairly in the following places because of their race or ethnic background:





Health care system often treats people unfairly based on their race or ethnic background


Trust the health care system all or most of the time to do what is right for their community

## Black And Hispanic Adults Report More Difficulty Finding Doctors With Shared Background, Affordable And Accessible Care


Percent of adults who say it is **difficult** to find each of the following:





### Black Adults More Likely Than White Adults To Report Some Negative Experiences With Providers


Percent who say they had each of the following experiences with a health care provider in the past 3 years:
